Last February, 1100 students stood up applauding, a farewell salute to the man who had served their school and community for 30 years.

Every person in the cheering auditorium had felt the influence of Mr. M. N. Funk. To some he had been the man behind the desk behind the door marked "Principal." To many he was a friend who had helped them in any way he could. To all, he was an outstanding man.

During his career at Latrobe High School, he accomplished many things. With the idea that a good plant is necessary to produce good students, he promoted many improvements. The homemaking cottage is still a novel idea in education. The new addition to the school relieved the crowded classrooms. The well lighted stadium caused students to lift their heads in pride.

His work extended into community life. Various organizations were proud to have him as a member. Through his help, these groups became more interested in school affairs. The forensic contests and many awards were the result. The town supported the school in whatever the students undertook. The band, marching gaily down Ligonier Street, is a living memorial of the campaign for new uniforms.




The new principal graduated from Geneva College and the University of Pittsburgh. He is interested in athletics, and was a former assistant football coach.

incurred in athletic participation. He is assisted by Dr. Jack Hamill.



The Working Scene

A whirl of sewing machines, clicking of a typewriter, tongue-twisting French verbs, and sparks from a spinning machine illustrate the many courses of study open to Latrobe High School students.

For those planning to attend college, the college preparatory course is offered. Two divisions, CPA and CPC, provide such subjects as sciences, mathematics, and foreign languages in addition to the English and social studies which are required of everyone.

Ready to take their places in the world of business are the graduates of the commercial course. Typing, shorthand, bookkeeping and office practice help prepare these students for jobs as accountants, secretaries, and clerks.

The industrial world is the choice of the boys who complete the trade course. The boys are able to pick a field in which to specialize, such as drafting, wood, electric, or machine shop.


Future homemakers learn all about running a home at the cottage. Cooking, sewing and other requirements for making a successful home life is taught in the home economics course.

TRADE STUDENTS Borza and King try their skill in the wood shop.






To balance the tests, book-reports, notebooks and other curricular tasks, casual class-work helped to make the past school year a memorable one for 1100 students.

Who minded English talks when everyone sang folk songs as part of the program? The strains of an accordion or a room full of students echoing "On Top of Old Smoky" helped make Friday English periods something to be laughed over for a long time.

Latin emerged from the days of Caesar and was modernized by the active Latiners. Projects clarified such questions as "What did a Roman house look like?" A congo line of Apollo and the Muses at the annual banquet was a never-to-be-forgotten scene.

Trips to Pittsburgh to visit the Nixon or to see the Pittsburgh Symphony enabled students to learn about the side of drama that isn't the movies. Songs from "Kiss Me Kate" were hummed for weeks after the trip. The bus ride was always fun and ending with "Three Cheers for the Bus Driver."

The timed march of the band sent thrills through the proud watchers. The group performed in new uniforms, going through intricate patterns between halves at the autumn football games.

Forensic season occupied the thoughts of everyone during the annual contests. Gnawed fingernails, jangled nerves and cash prizes were the trademarks of the proud winners.


Debates livened up the social study classes. Arguments waxed hot as each student exercised his freedom of speech. Many new and often humorous ideas were initiated in sessions such as this.









The Golden Eagles of Derry Township spoiled Latrobe's initial encounter in the new Memorial Stadium, trouncing the Cats, 12-0. Townsshipper John Zubaty's smashing line bucks led the way to a well earned triumph for the Eagles.





cats. Rabbits, Guzick, Seymour and Co. completely outclassed the locals with a 33-6 drubbing, with Vic Rabbits demonstrating a terrific exhibition of broken field running. Junior Jimmy Smart secured the locals only tally on a seven yard sprint in the final canto.

Showing marked improvements, the Wildcats narrowly missed dumping Altoona as the Mountain Lions eked out a 13-7 triumph. A short-circuited aerial and a Cat fumble deep in Latrobe territory led to the Altoona scores. Fullback Ron Lynch skirted left end for nine yards and the Latrobe touchdown.

Then the Wildmen dropped a 21-20 heart-breaker to the Connellsville Cokers. Blowing the lead twice, the Cat gridders lost on a blocked placement try. Joe Beredino tallied two six-

pointers and two conversions to pace the Latrobe scoring attack.

A week later, the Orangemen succumbed to a powerful Greensburg Golden Lion eleven by an 18-0 count. The underdog Cats hung on grimly the first half.

Smarting under a poor record, a hepped-up Wildcat crew belted the Wilkesburg Tigers 33-7 on a water-logged Memorial Stadium turf. Vince Rizzo scored two touchdowns and Bell, Beredino and Smith each scored one for Latrobe. Bill McGinnis booted three bonus points as the Cats completely outclassed the Tigers.

The 1952 Wildcat gridgers had their season ended on a sour note by the Uniontown Red Raiders. The undefeated Raiders rocked the visiting Orangemen by a 46-0 count. Thus Latrobe ended with a 2-7 ledger.

Gridders' Action

Latrobe's Freshmen and Jayvee football teams both compiled fair season records last fall, as the Freshmen won one, lost three, and tied one, while the Jayvees won three and lost two.

In their first year of interscholastic competition the Freshmen showed well against keen competition. Greensburg dropped the Latrobe first year boys by a 20-0 score. Next, the Frosh tied Jeannette 6-6, but were again beaten by Greensburg by a 19-6 count. Winning the first and only game of the season the Freshmen dropped Connellsville by a commanding 33-0 score. Victory was short-lived as Jeannette again dropped the little Cats by a 14-0 score.

Latrobe's Jayvees in their five game schedule won three games and lost two. The Jayvees were dropped by Greensburg and Jeannette, while they were victors over the Connellsville, Derry Township and Greensburg Junior Varsity football teams.






