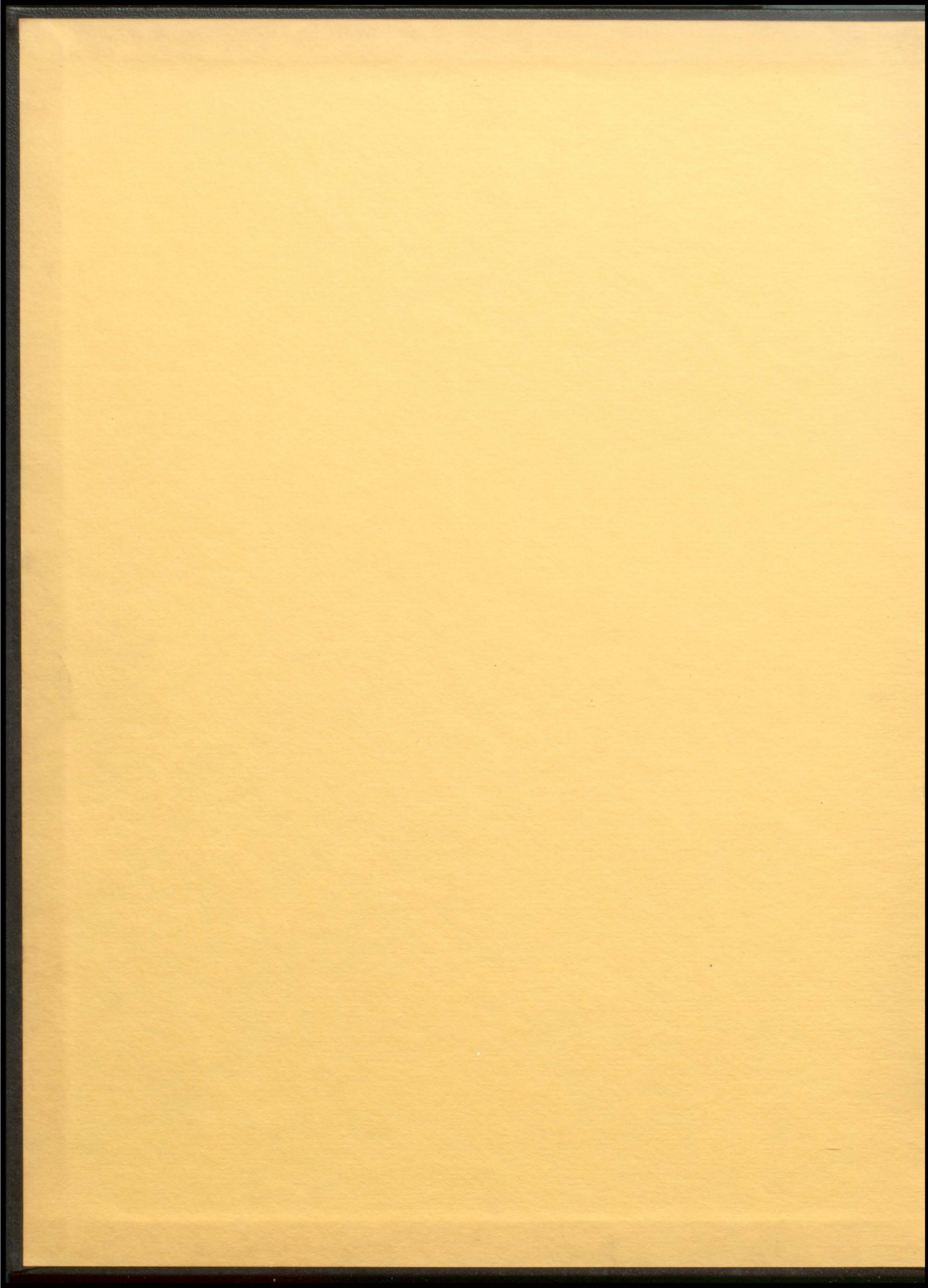

SAYS FAREWELL

Thirty-Four Years Of Rendered Service

After serving the Latrobe Public School education program for thirty-four years, one of Latrobe's most outstanding men says farewell.

Dr. John G. Hulton finishes his career at the end of this school term. Many students benefited from his fine work as Superintendent of Schools. Some knew him only as a busy important man; many as a friend. Students, teachers, friends and business associates know that his work here in Latrobe is not without acknowledgement and appreciation.

Before serving as superintendent, Dr. Hulton was a teacher and principal in Latrobe High. In his first year, he instructed students in Latin, Algebra, civics and also taught science. Two years later, Dr. Hulton received the position of principal of the high school and served at this post for seven years.

Following this, Dr. Hulton was made Superintendent of Schools and rendered his services in the position for a period of twenty-five years. Along with serving as superintendent, Dr. Hul-

ton is a member of the Pennsylvania State Education Association. He was also elected as president of the Department of Administration.

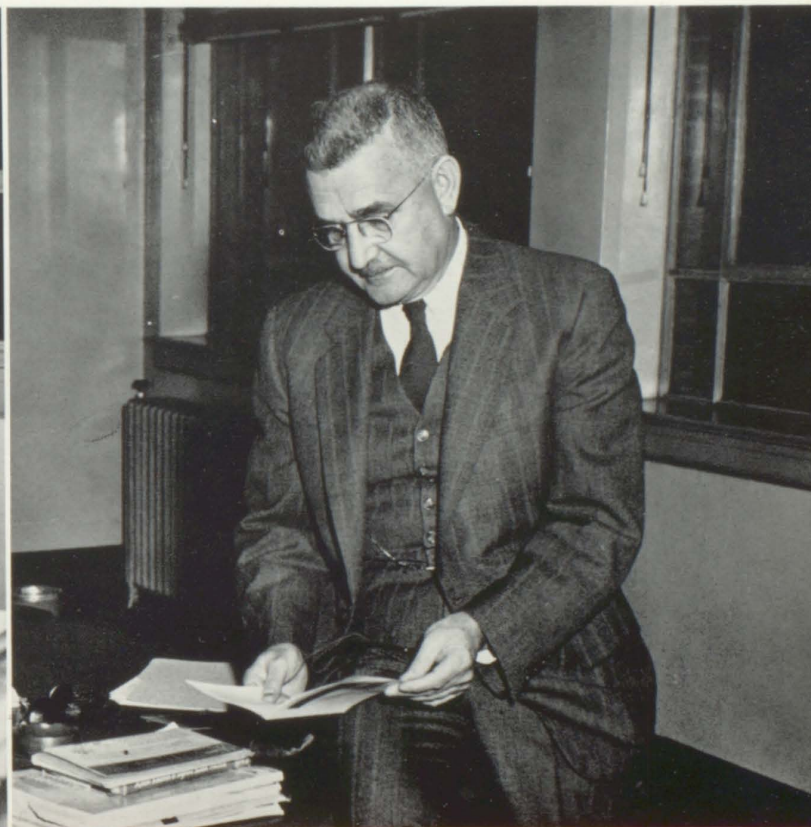
The Education of Dr. Hulton was received in three different colleges. He attended Franklin College for four years, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree, at the University of Pittsburgh he earned his Masters degree. Concluding his education, Dr. Hulton obtained his Doctor of Laws degree at St. Vincent College.

Although a very busy man, Dr. Hulton takes time out for his several hobbies. Prominent among these are reading biographies and playing golf. Presiding behind the desk in the Administration Building Dr. Hulton was always ready to take time out to lend people a helping hand.

His resignation becomes effective on June 30, 1954. Dr. Hulton has no definite plans for the future. His outstanding character which guided him in the past will light the way for his future.

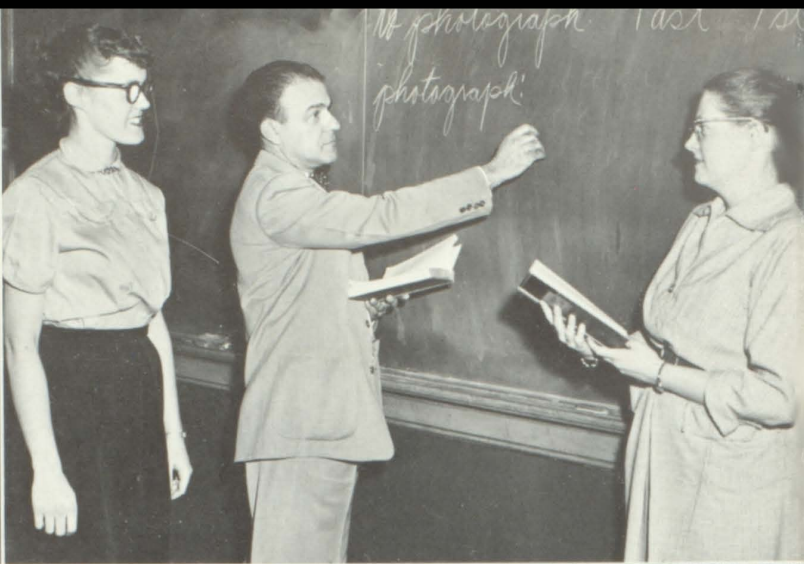

Freshmen and juniors well remember the long, cold treks in December to Second Ward School to receive their physical examinations.

Administering these were eleven local medical doctors. Medics who assisted Dr. J. Wiley Hartman, school physician, are Doctors G. F. Nealon, William Sipe, F. Clay Gibson, W. H. Schimpf, and Walter Berberich. Other doctors were Dr. Paul Mankovich, Dr. G. E. Huber, Dr. Thomas Sproch, Dr. Walter Hazlett, and Dr. Joseph Doherty.

Immediately preceding the physical examinations, the students' teeth were checked by Dr. B. A. Wright, the school dentist. Checking vision and hearing were the school nurse and several assistants. The recently purchased audiometer was used to test hearing ability.

This was the second school term that the examinations were conducted at Second Ward. Formerly all physical exams were given in the Health Room.

To aid the school nurse, Mrs. Florence Young, a student attendant was present in the Health Room each period during school hours. The girls administered first aid to students in case of accidents or illness. First period assistants included Eileen Felbaum and Mary Reed, while Mary Ann Koshar was in charge second.

Distributing Band-aids and checking temperatures the seventh and eighth periods were Jackie Sandacz and Shirley O'Barto. Ill pupils may procure Health Room permits from classes whenever necessary. Everyday until four o'clock the Health Room is open to students and faculty members requiring medical treatment.

In early spring all students and teachers of Latrobe High received X-rays. These tests for tuberculosis were provided free of charge by a visiting mobile unit.

Students in the Trade and Homemaking Courses of Latrobe High School receive the best possible preparation in their selected field.

Boys in the Trade Course are trained to use their hands and machines in creating useful articles. This course is profitable in their career following graduation. It provides valuable knowledge for work in the many factories of the district.

In the wood shop the boys make such articles as desks, cedar chests, and tables. The electric shop boys wire controls for motors, repair appliances, and repair electrical equipment for the school. Machine Shop students learn to operate lathes, grinders, and other tools used by a machinist. They also become acquainted with precision tools.

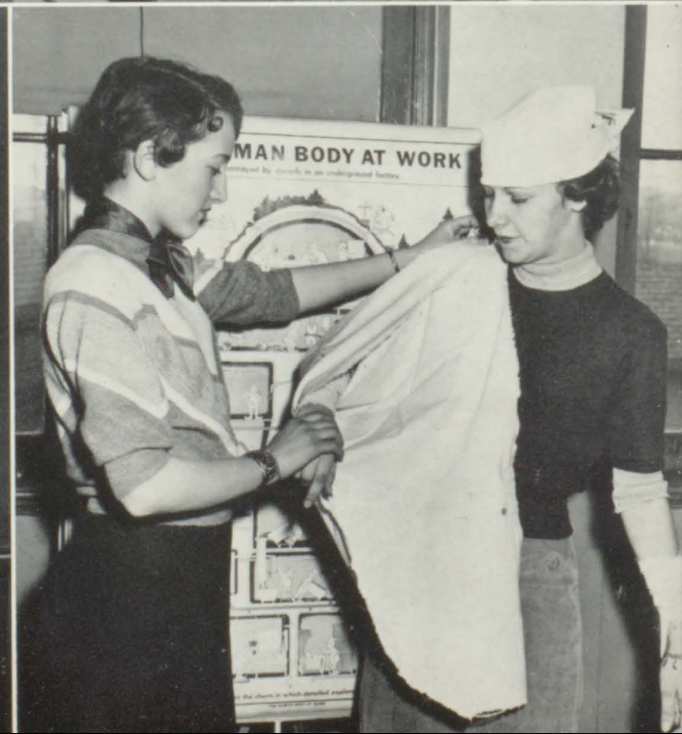
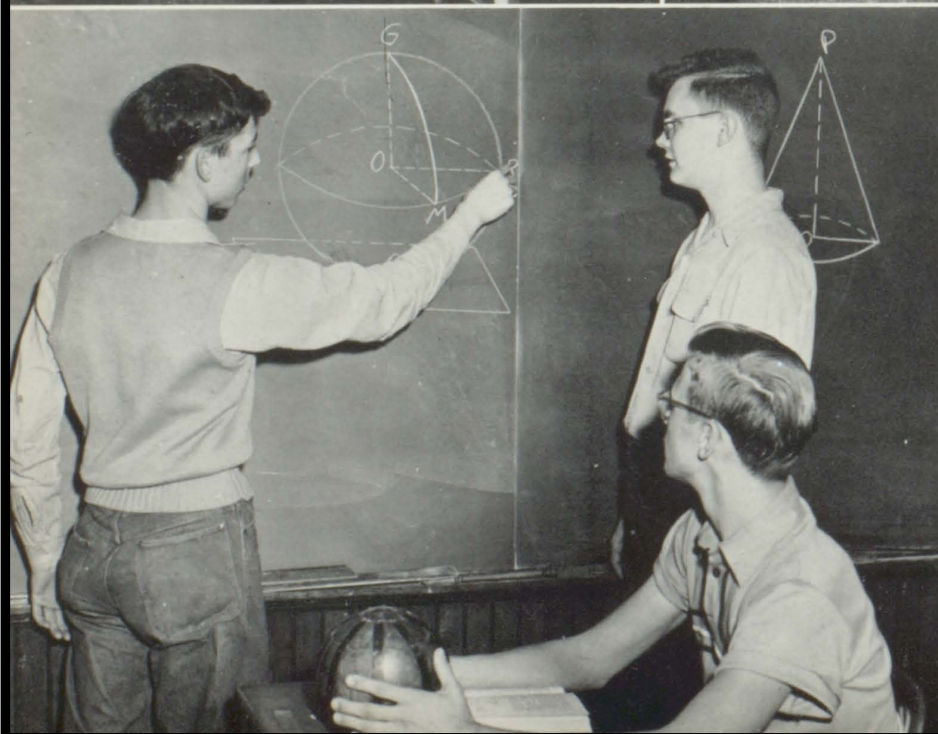
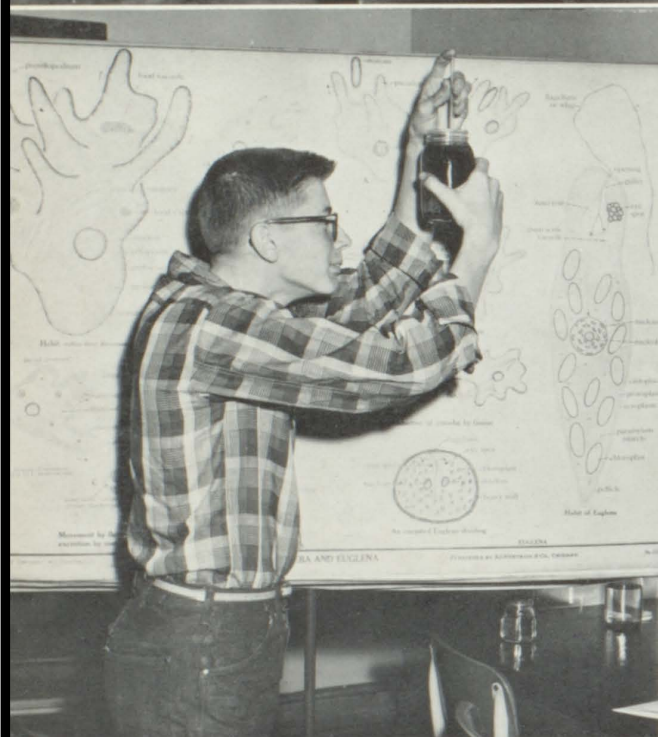

Clackety, clackety of a student's heels resounds through the halls, as a drink is obtained by the student during a study hall in seventh period in our school.

Aspiring young journalists from Journalism I classes hear it amid the notes they are taking.

In physics class, the sound brings thoughts of the cool water, which appears at just the turn of a hand. To brother chemists, the sound means a stretch from the crowded lab.

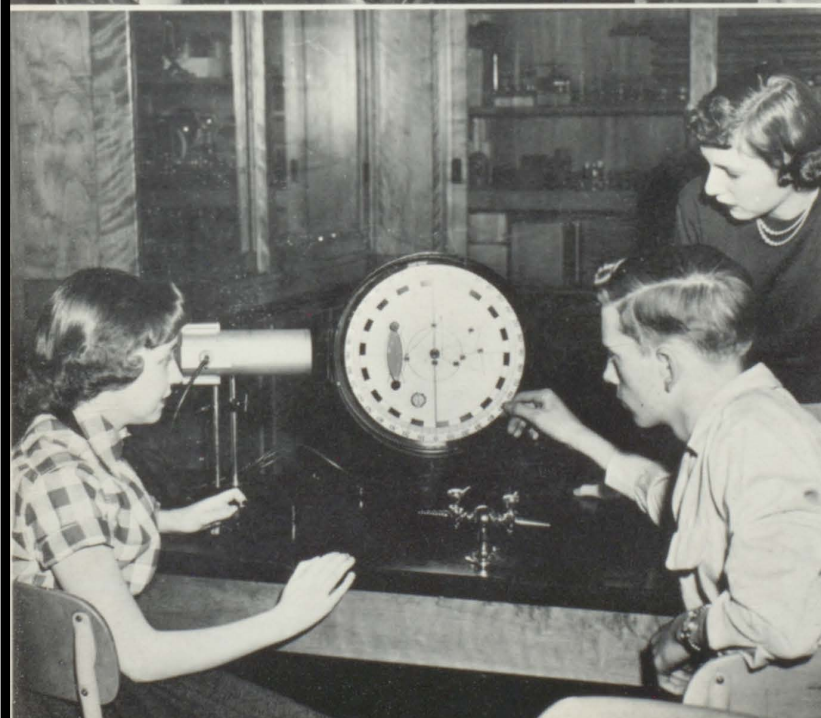

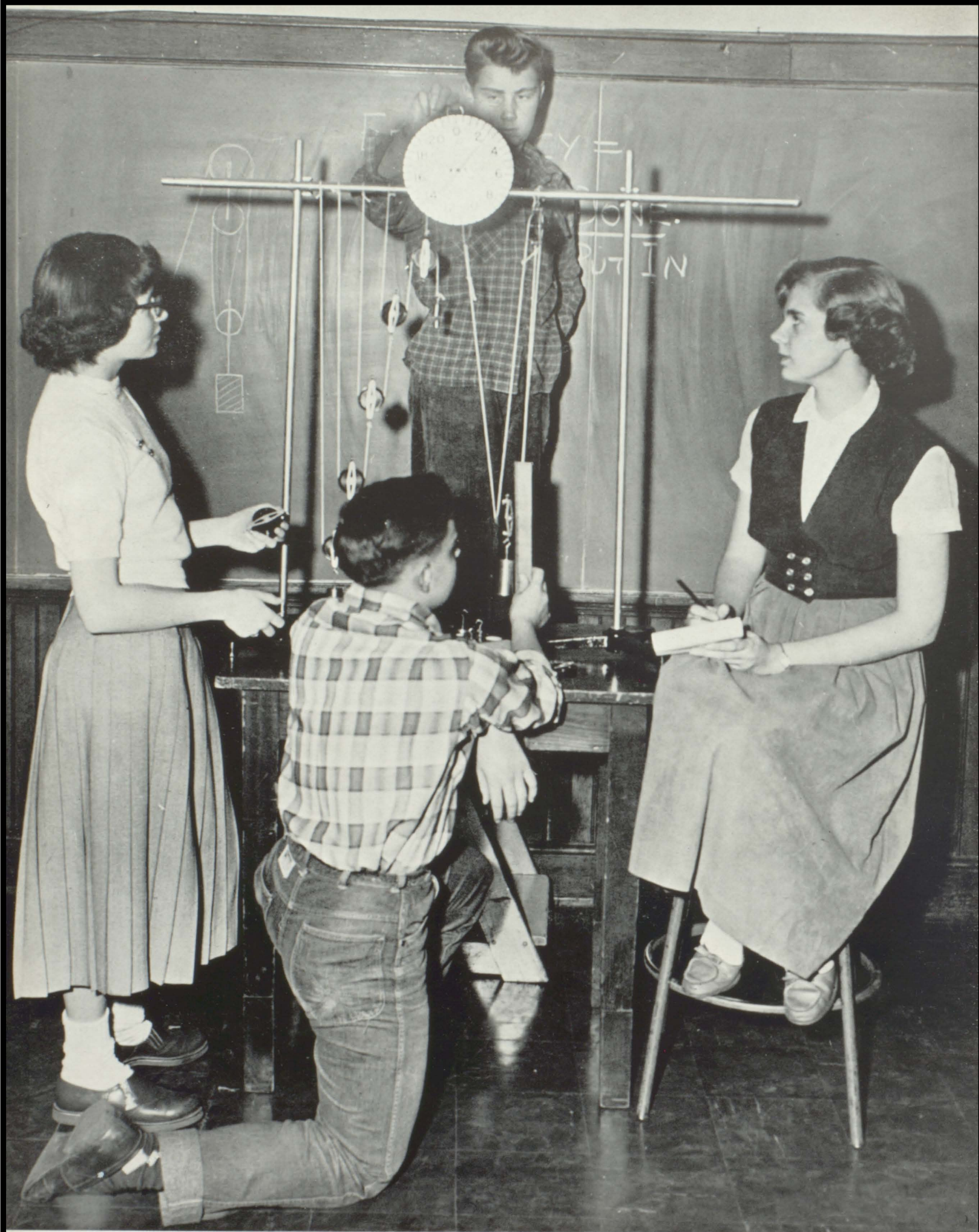

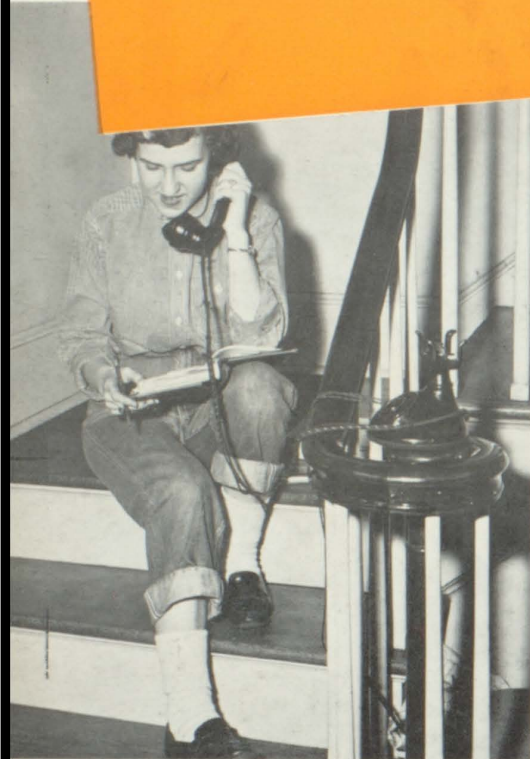

Headaches and enjoyments of a Journalism student are of many natures. Do's and don'ts about passive verbs, stories that are either too short or too long and rules of style tend to keep the journalist constantly alert.

Students wishing to become full-fledged journalists must first go through the training of Journalism I. The general fundamentals of the art of writing are taught and learned in that class. A journalist must learn the five "W's" — who, what, when, where, and why — besides knowing how to apply them in leads. During the first year he also learns the art of writing headlines. Journalism I class is held during the seventh period.

After completing the first year of training, students are permitted to enter Journalism II. The main undertaking in this class is the work of "beating" the deadline. Stories by the members of the staff also appear in the local Latrobe Bulletin providing details of school activities. The Journalism Department is supervised by Mr. William Couchenour.

Achieving his 300 inches and standing in the upper third of his class scholastically, the writer is admitted into the Quill & Scroll. This nation-wide journalism organization follows the principles of truth, loyalty, friendship, leadership, opportunity and initiative.

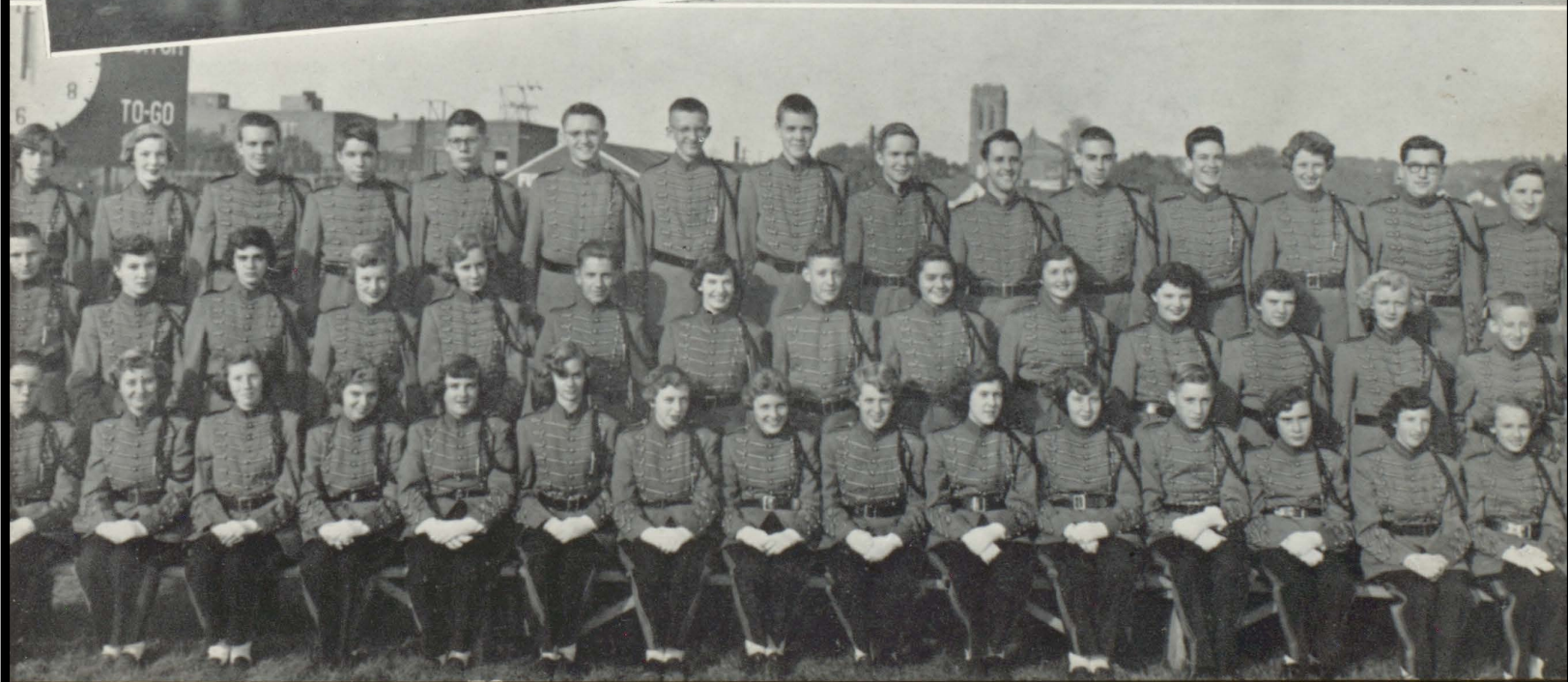
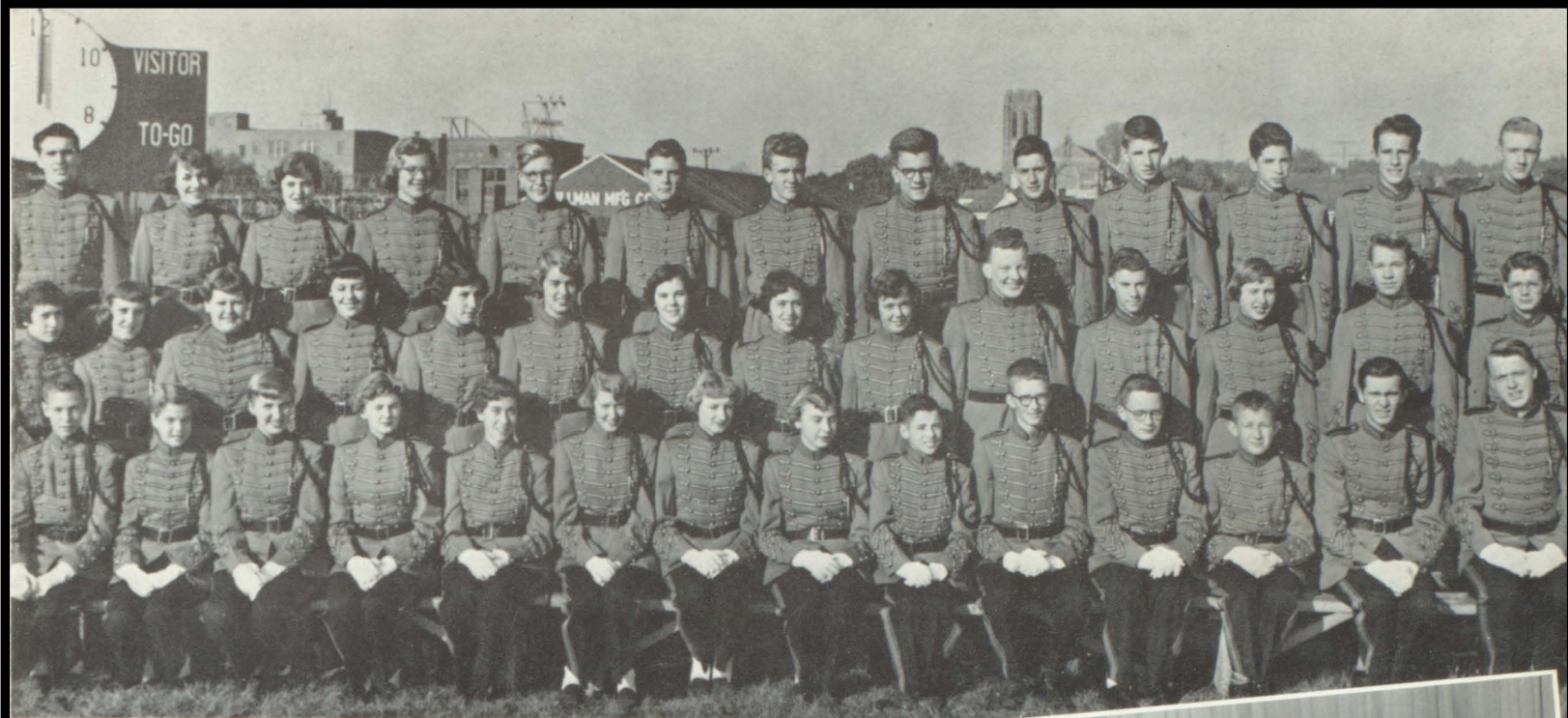

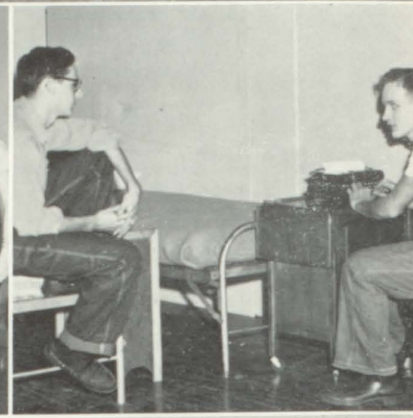
During the Christmas season the class pre-

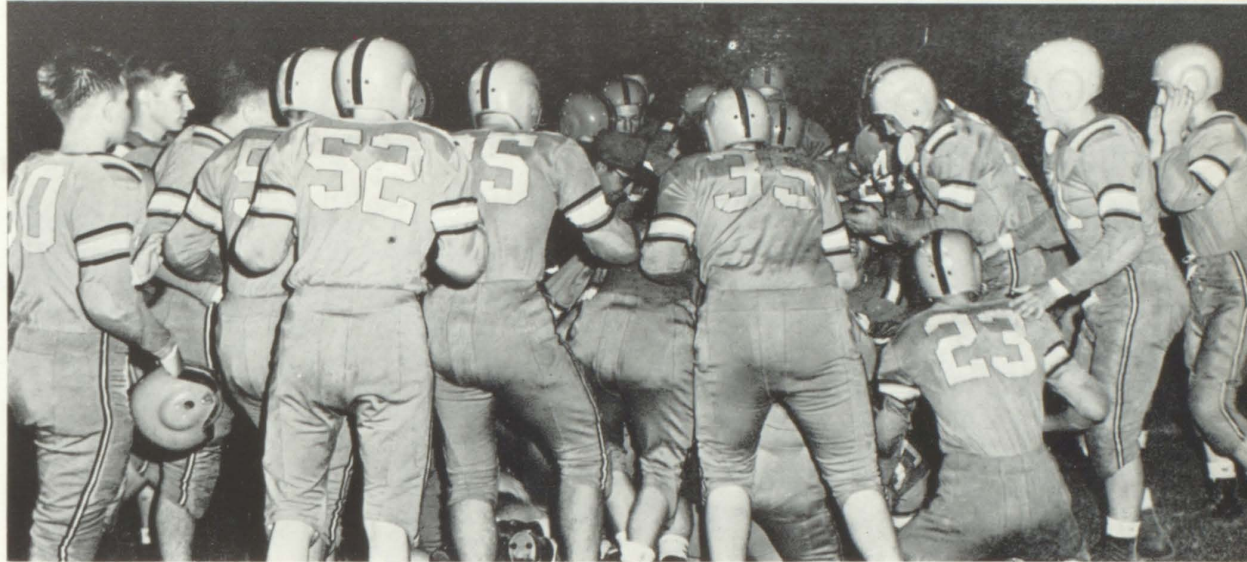

In the semi-finals, Latrobe was eliminated from the Tourney by the Jeannette Jayhawks, 51-46.

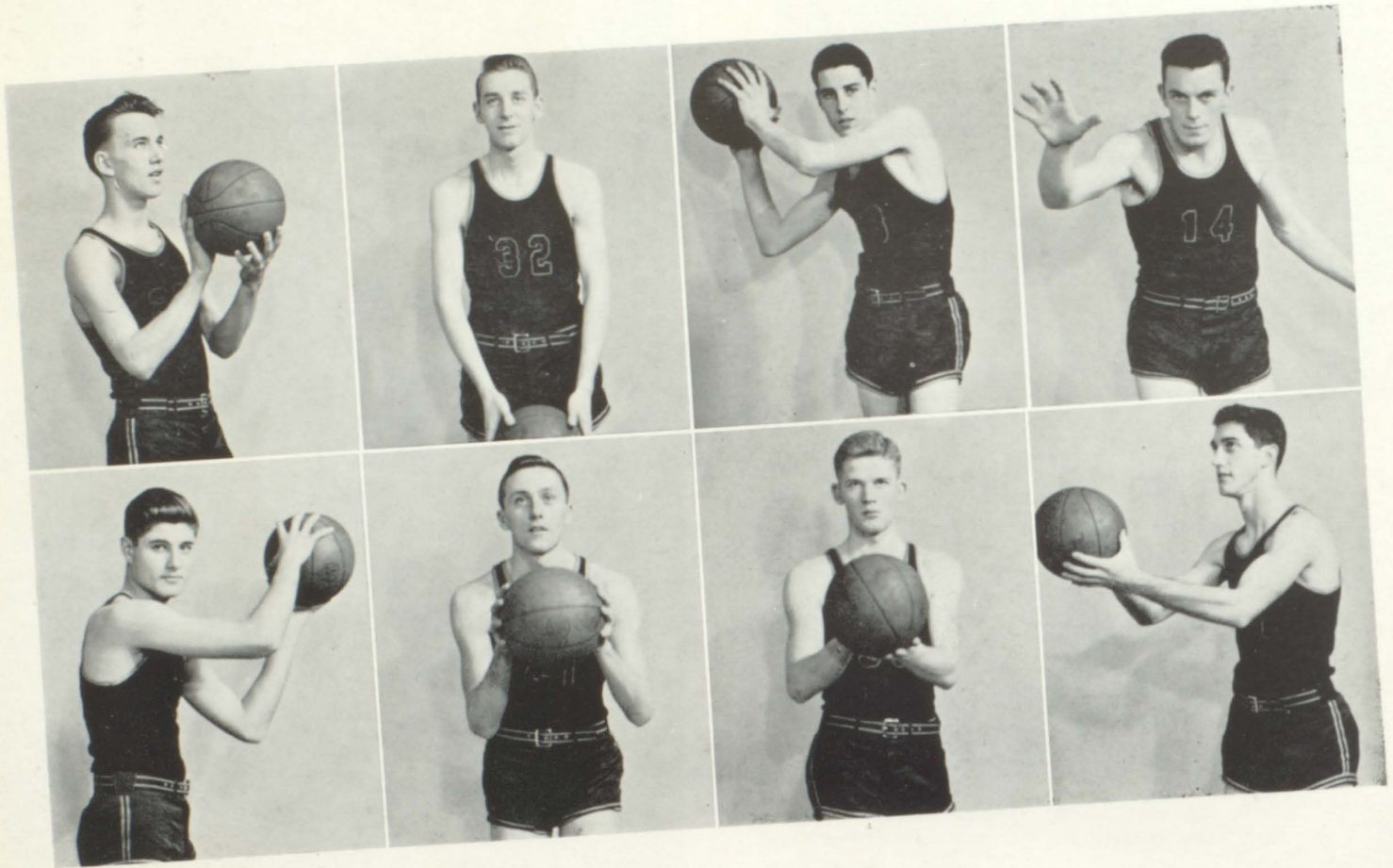

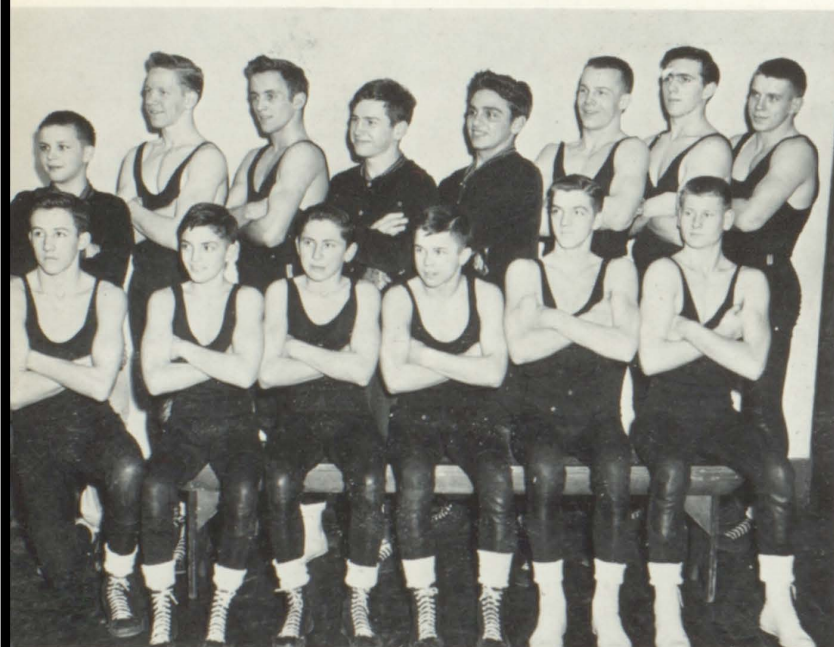

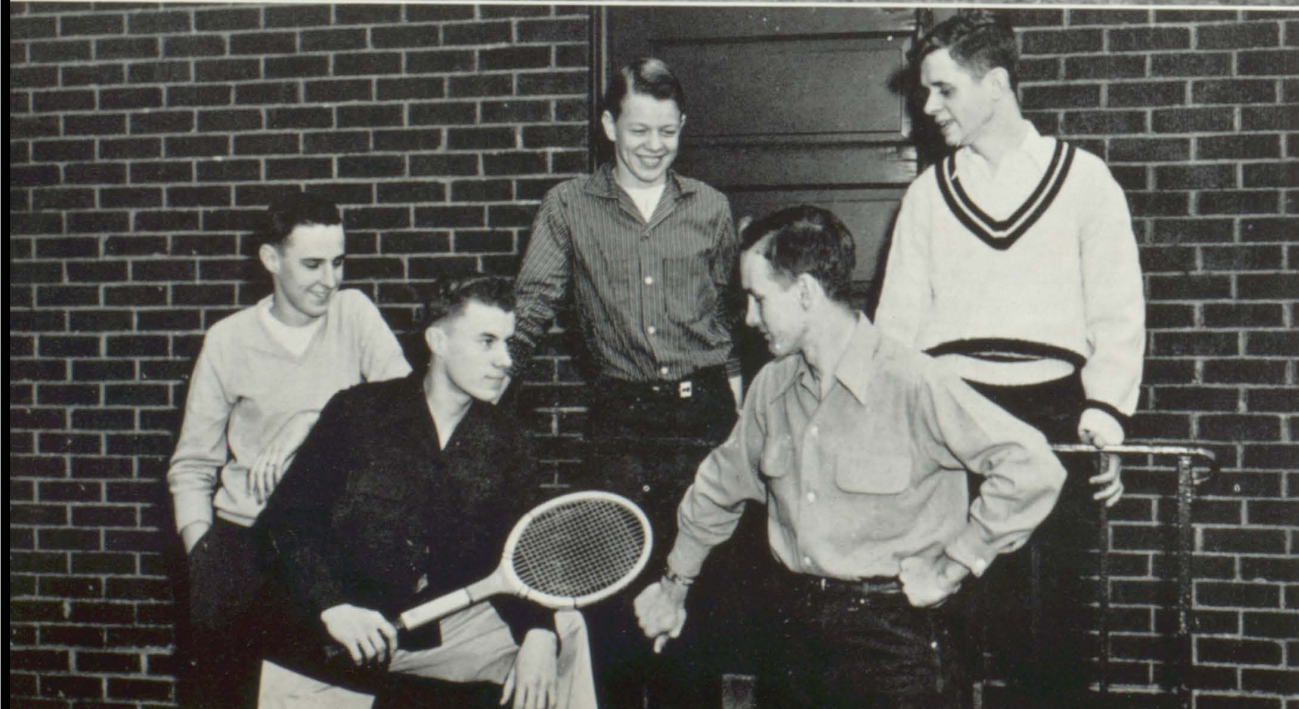
ingdon. The Wildcat golfers also sent two participants to the WPIAL tourney.
