

Principal Robert M. Crawford was found an




SUPERINTENDENT OF Latrobe Public Schools David A. Snyder refers to the county map as reference for the site of the new high school.





Medical Administration Donates Time, Effort To Protect Physical Health Of Students

Striving to protect and safeguard the health of the student body, the medical staff, composed of nine doctors and one nurse, administered physical examinations during the year.

Dr. J. Wiley Hartman, assisted by Dr. Gerald Huber, Dr. F. Clay Gibson, Dr. G. F. Nealon, Dr. Walter Berberich, Dr. Paul Mankovich, Dr. Raymond Sarver, Dr. John Mazero, Dr. John Parker and Dr. Thomas Sproch, headed the Medical Department. Supervising the dental examinations for the year was Dr. M. A. Showalter.

Juniors and freshmen received their physicals during the first quarter at the School Clinic in Second Ward School. Mrs. Florence Young, the nurse for Latrobe schools, aided the doctors and organized the schedule for the students' check-ups.

Parents were informed of any physical defects by slips sent to them by the examining doctors and Mrs. Young. Students were advised to consult their family physicians concerning any impairments. The primary reason for the annual examinations was to make parents and the students aware of the presence of any physical defects.

The check-ups included examination of the chest, heart, feet and blood pressure by the doctors. Mrs. Young administered eye tests and used the audiometer for checking the ears.

Eight girls, under the supervision of Mrs. Young, attended the management of the health room during the year. The function of this convenience is to aid students who become ill during the school day.

Girls in charge of the health room during the morning sessions were Jean Melago, Marcia Vesco, Joan Forejt and Sandra Donahey. Serving in the capacity of attendants in the afternoon were Joyce Pavick, Judy Byers, Joann Lencoski and Mary Ann Stepanic. The majority of these girls are considering entrance into the field of nursing and thus received valuable information to aid them in their future occupations.

The eight girls were not allowed to administer internal medication to pupils. Bandaging abrasions, tending to bruises, treatment of mild burns and other inflammations and making ill students as comfortable as possible were some of the daily tasks performed by the novice medical aspirants.

Mrs. Florence Young's duties included the assistance of school physicians and aiding the health room attendants in the detection and effective treatment of contagious rashes, chronic rashes, and other minor infirmities possessed by high school students. She performed services for the elementary schools as well. Health room attendants received information pertaining to medical care from her. Aiding in the chest X-rays for the Latrobe public schools was also under the supervision of Mrs. Young.

Mrs. Young organized the schedule for the students' physicals. Assistant Principal William Yates supervised the sending of the pupils to the clinic.

Mrs. Young stated, "The health of the school child does not only depend on the school medical department but combines the efforts of the parent, the teacher and the people of the community.

"The school children in Latrobe are fortunate in having so many interested, capable citizens who have always co-operated fully with the school health department and have helped to make the entire environment of the child safer and healthier."

Pupils Strive Hard To Procure Valuable Knowledge By Faculty Instructions In Classes

Selecting the curriculum suited to their future vocations upon graduation was the primary objective of students as they embarked on four years of earnest educational endeavor.

Six fields of study were available. Correct choices provided them with the needed subjects and skills in preparation for their chosen careers. Students could obtain help in making decisions from

the guidance director and school administration.

Social studies ranked as an essential part of the six courses. In English classes pupils delivered talks every week about varied topics. Highlighting senior activities in the department were the orations. Students with speaking and writing abilities entered other forensic contests in conjunction with their English classes. Grammar, vocabulary and compo-

sition writing were also taught. Reading such classics as the "Odyssey", "Julius Caesar", "Silas Marner" and "Great Short Stories" occupied much of the class' time.

Seniors studied diligently Problems of Democracy to learn more about the policies and government of the United States. Juniors' study of American History included the Constitution and discussions of past and present great events. Sophomores explored the ancient and modern history of the world. Learning the background and some geography of Pennsylvania proved helpful to the freshmen. Book reports, maps and other projects were required to maintain high grades.

College Preparatory courses offered the collegebound student the best opportunity to prepare for higher education. Beginning with Algebra, the students ventured into Plane Geometry, Solid Geometry and Trigonometry.

In science courses students became acquainted with basic points of more complicated fields. Laboratory experiments in Chemistry and Physics proved enlightening to the class members. Biology students were amazed to find under the microscope organisms that they did not realize existed.

Other students entered the field of foreign languages. Freshmen and sophomores studied the ancient language of the Romans and their culture. Upperclassmen engaged in the study of modern languages, French and Spanish. In these subjects, teachers used visual aids. After taping voices, surprised students heard what they actually sounded like. They also viewed movies about the people whose dialect they were learning to speak.





enrolled in the trade course completed two years of general shop. During the remaining four semesters, each student worked in one of four specialized fields.

Wood, machine, electric and drafting comprised the specific training shops. The woodworker made such projects as bookcases, end tables, coffee tables and desks. Instructed in the proper use of such equipment as shapers, tools, cutters, grinders and saws were the students choosing machine shop. Through this training students gained experience enabling them to fultill many odd jobs around the school. Armatures, milling machines, blueprinting machines and electric saws aided the members preparing for jobs as members of industrial crews.



Latrobe High School had the experience this year of having two foreign students seek their education in its classrooms. In October, 1961, Emel and Necip Alev traveled with their family from Ankara, Turkey, to make their new home here.

One difference between the educational systems is the work load. In Turkey it is not compulsory to attend high school unless a college education is desired. However, all students who choose this form of education, as Necip and Emel did, are required to take the same subjects. These 15 include several science courses, history, geography, a military class for both boys and girls, mathematics, foreign languages and the arts.

Testing methods also are unlike those in America. After the first three years of high school are completed, an oral and a written examination are given to each student. If they pass these, they advance to the Lycee to finish their schooling.

When asked what impressed him most about the United States, Necip replied, "I like the freedom of opinions. Also, the pupils are very nice and understanding of my position. The teachers are perfect teachers. They are very understanding and willing to help."

The students have welcomed the Alevs into the school and the community.

Education is a key which unlocks many doors. During the last four years at Latrobe High School, the Class of 1962 has used this key to open the doors to their future life after graduation.

For those planning to gain further knowledge after commencement, the CPA and CPC courses offered the necessary subjects for college entrance, while trade and homemaking courses have opened the doors for those with attention focused on vocational pursuits. Similar opportunities were afforded to students through the general and commercial courses.

The click-clickety clack of typewriter keys could be heard as students prepared for clerical or secretarial positions, and in the woodshop the whirr of machinery may have meant that a trade student was in the process of completing a pair of tables. Senior homemaking girls employed other machin-

ery and devices as their key as they completed their orientation into the domestic arts.

Passing a physics or chemistry class, one could find many seniors hard at work. For those interested in modern languages, it is possible that the pronunciation of a difficult French or Spanish verb was the key they were seeking. Others studied Salesmanship, Office Practice, Commercial Geography and Commercial Law.

All twelfth graders utilized the Problems of Democracy classes to learn the principles upon which their government is based. In English IV they found the most valuable key of all—the key to communication. This was achieved through the study of vocabulary and the literary classics and the preparation of research themes.

The key has been made available for those who were willing to accept the challenge it presents.





Meeting in the auditorium at the first sign of imaginary smoke, the floor leaders, William Smithly, Bruce Robbins, Thomas O'Rourke, Gerald Murphy and Head Patroler David Ayers, swiftly took charge of the floors and doors.

Other members decided the shortest route to transport equipment to the practice blaze. All the necessary implements were carried swiftly to the disaster area. They checked individual rooms for unauthorized persons, opened doors and windows and inspected for flames within the electrical system. The Fire Patrol was organized by Mr. Robert Cook in 1948.

In the Oratorical Contest sponsored by the Rotary Club, Lee Anne Goodman won first place with her oration, "A New Birth of Freedom." Ending her speech, she stated, "Once again Americans will meet the challenge. Our children will look back upon us and say, "We are the product of a stalwart generation—a generation that gave freedom a new birth—that made the light of a new day."

Receiving second honors was Regina Maher with her presentation, "A Day of Reckoning." Warning Americans against the dangers of collectivism, she asserted, "Collectivism in the form of the welfare state is insidious! It hides easily behind appeals for humanitarian reliefs. It flows from the lips of our politicians when they say, 'Let's help these poor unfortunates."

Nancy Campbell, third place winner, closed her oration, "Patriotism—A Thing of the Past?", with this cautioning: "The greatest gift given to me at my birth was a heritage of freedom. I was born free. Will my children, your children, and our children's children be able to make this same statement in future years?"

injured through a driver's assumption that because he had a green light, no one was going to cross the street directly in his path? How many?—I'll tell you. The figure came to well over a quarter of a million people. Yes, all those injuries because someone assumed too much!"

Other seniors who displayed their abilities by competing in the finals were Linda Kennedy, Michael Rizzo, Phyllis Watters and Robert Pochet.

"Resolved: The Federal government should equalize education opportunities by means of grants to the state for public elementary and secondary education" was the topic of the annual Ruth Robb Debate. Taking the laurels this year was the affirmative team of Virginia Dovey and Russell Walker. Comprising the negative team were Fred Fletcher and Thomas Haswell.

The winning couple cited the need for federal aid by stressing the poorer states of the union can't provide the type of education needed in today's world, and in the world-wide struggle with communism this nation can't afford to waste brain power. Federal aid would help make possible the well-trained people our society demands, was the contention of the debators.

In presenting the negative side, Fletcher and Haswell said the need for aid is exaggerated, and cited the danger of federal control as the main argument against national aid to education. The team also questioned the constitutionality of such a program. In addition, federal aid would reward poor schools with cash, leading people of local areas to do less for themselves and to depend on the federal government to carry the load.

In rebutial, Dovey and Walker said the danger of federal control can be eliminated, and in dealing with the constitutionality of the concept, the debators quoted financial statements concerning taxing for the general welfare which federal aid to education would promote.

The topic of discussion in the Kiwanis Club Extemporaneous Speaking Contest was "Urbanization and Its Effects on Society." The grand prize was awarded to Robert Pochet, senior, for his presentation. Winners in each class were Russell Walker, junior; Virginia Dovey, sophomore, and Pamela Saxman, freshman. Other semi-finalists participating in the contest were Thomas Baybrook, Clifford Evans, Judy Campbell and Kenneth Poorman.

These three major contests, held during the month of March, are sponsored by local service organizations to promote an interest in public speaking. Excluding the orations in which participation is limited to seniors, the contests are open to members of all classes.















a team can play during a season.








JACK WRIGHT watches for an opening to get the ball to pivot man Fred Steele, while Derry rivals defend basket.














 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{FRED}}$ STEELE watches teammates John Heinnickel and James Williams as they control rebounds off defensive boards.



The grapplers finished third in the Section Tournament as Gerard Murphy and Richard Ludwig emerged champions. However, both boys lost in the Regional matches.


