
Thanksgiving came and was gone and then, as Christmas neared, plans were made for homeroom decorations and the sound of carols filled the corridors.

Striving to maintain and improve the Greater Latrobe School District was the task of the administration.

With the joining of the Unity-Youngstown School District and the Latrobe Borough Schools, the Greater Latrobe School District was formed. Heading this new system was the School Board, consisting of 19 members. Mr. Carl Shirey served as Board president and Mr. Frank A. French, Jr., as vice-president. It was the job of the Board to plan the curriculum, hire teachers and arrange for necessary repairs on buildings. Filling the office of Superintendent of Schools was Mr. David A. Snyder. Mr. Snyder oversaw the general workings of the Latrobe Public Schools.



WITH THE help of Doctors Walter Berberich, Maurice Showalter, J. Wiley Hartman and Gerald N. Huber the school provides for the physical examinations of its student body.

Administering physical examinations, endeavoring to shield and protect the health of the pupils and aiding in other medical matters during the year was the school medical staff.

Dr. J. Wiley Hartman, aided by Dr. Walter Berberich, Dr. F. Clay Gibson, Dr. G. F. Nealon, Dr. Paul Mankovich, Dr. Gerald Huber, Dr. John Mazero and Dr. John Parker, comprised the medical group. Directing the dental examinations was Dr. M. A. Showalter.

Nurses Mrs. Florence Young, Mrs. Lois Shirey and Mrs. Jacqueline Shivetts assisted the physicians and managed the schedule for the junior physical examinations and the freshman vision and hearing tests at the School Infirmary in the Second Ward School.

Listed as objectives of the examination by the doctors were the chest, heart, feet and blood pressure. Mrs. Young, using the audiometer for checking the ears and administering eye tests, was able to detect other problems of the pupils.

Mrs. Young and the examining doctors notified the parents of the students of any physical defect found. The school nurse suggested that the students have impairments checked by their family physician or eye doctor. The examinations were of help to the students by telling them of any defect and giving them the opportunity to correct it.

Their jobs were mainly to administer help to students becoming ill while in school. Some of the girls intend to enter the field of nursing and thus gain valuable instruction to aid them in their future occupations.

Girls serving as attendants gave their services voluntarily. During the morning sessions Elaine Krinock, Margaret Walker, Sharon Wineland and Joyce Parker performed the duties. Jane Downs, Dorothy Biller, Patricia Cline and Patricia Harvey were in charge in the afternoon.

In the carrying out of their duties the eight

girls tended to bruises, bandaged abrasions and applied liniment for the treatment of mild burns and other inflammations. Administering internal medication was not permitted.

Besides assisting with physical examinations, Mrs. Young's duties included aiding health room attendants by giving information pertaining to medical care, helping in the chest -rays for the Latrobe public schools and administering services for the elementary schools as well.

Visiting the high school daily throughout the year, Mrs. Young advised students concerning physical impairments, such as chronic rashes, contageous ailments and other infirmities which may have affected student health.

Speech Contests Develop Poise, Oratorical Ability Of Individual






mote worthy school activities, to provide opportunities for student cooperation and participation in developing a greater responsibility for discipline.


The Council furnished the student body with seven programs conducted by professional entertainers at the special assemblies. Members of the organization also led devotions and introduced speakers at the regular assemblies.







Also assisting the group was Mr. Frederick Halsall, vocational coordinator.









Drilling the team during the season, Coaches James Schumaker and Robert Laing worked together to develop the skills of future LHS varsity players.



Hardwood Sport Combines Agility With Skillful Tactics, Fan Appeal






With a section slate of two wins against 12 defeats, Latrobe finished ahead of Mt. Pleasant.


The overall record showed six wins as opposed to the 15 losses suffered by the Cats. Lack of experience hampered the play of the Wildcat cagers during the section competition.




Under the tutelage of Mr. Charles Barr during the 1962-63 season, the jayvee basketball team experienced a six win, 16 loss record.




Frosh Learn Basketball Basics While Vying In Initial Season




Cross-country proved a successful effort for Head Coach William West, who completed his second winning season at Latrobe High with a 4-2 record.

The harriers opened the season's competition by attending the annual Uniontown Invitational Meet, on September 22. Latrobe, as a team placed fourth out of the six contesting schools. Junior runner Thomas Potthoff earned one of the ten awarded trophies by finishing fifth in the overall standings.








into National Honor Society, Mu Alpha Theta and Quill and Scroll. Deserving students received scholarships for their college education.


