
You know, they had come a long way—all of them. Each became a year older and wiser. Part of that wisdom, be it a large or small portion, was gained within the realm of a class room.








Close Of School Year Brings Recollections Of Past Events





### Doctors Encourage Health Study As Essential To Everyday Life

To protect the health and to discover unknown physical defects of high school students were among the objectives of the doctors and nurses comprising the medical staff.

In addition to Dr. J. Wiley Hartman, head school physician, eight medical examiners constituted the staff. The medical men included Dr. Walter Berberich, Dr. F. Clay Gibson, Dr. Robert Gordon, Dr. Gerald Huber, Dr. Paul Mankovich, Dr. John Mazero, Dr. G. F. Nealon and Dr. John Parker. Dr. M. A. Showalter administered dental examinations.

The doctors conducted examinations of each junior and all new pupils enrolled in the school. If any defects were found, parents were notified in order that corrective measures could be taken. During the physicals all of the potential troubles were investigated. Different tests were administered by the examining doctors.

Aiding the physicians were the school nurses, Mrs. Lois Shirey, Miss Janet Miller and Mrs. Jacqueline Shivetts, assistant nurse. Among the duties of the nurses was the conduction of eye examinations for all students and a hearing test for the ninth and eleventh graders. Through the use of an audiometer, any hearing loss can be detected as well as the degree of the damage.

It was the further duty of the nurses to notify parents of the physical condition of students. If any detect was detected, the nurses advised that the tamily physician be consulted.







Acting as captains were Romansky and Bollinger. Mr. Frederick Halsall was faculty adviser to the group and was assisted by Mr. Earl Karasack.




All junior and senior commercial students were eligible for membership. Meetings were held on the first Monday of each month.













In preparing for varsity competition next year, Latrobe High's junior varsity football squad completed a successful 1963 season in compiling a record of four wins against two defeats.









### Derry Area Upset Highlights Varsity Basketball Action


Compiling a record of 4 wins and 10 losses, the Latrobe High varsity cagers finished in the sixth position in Section II-A competition.














The Cats bowed to Mt. Pleasant 53-50 and again to Jeannette 74-53 before breaking a six game losing streak against Connellsville, 66-51.




victories this year, Tom Bell gained his fourth consecutive county title while 'Iom Wadsworth won nis third tournament crown.



With Tom Potthoff finishing 17 in the PIAA cross-country meet, the Wildcat harriers ended their season with a record of one win and four defeats.





During the 1964 track season, the Latrobe High squad competed in a 13-meet schedule consisting of six dual meets, a triangular and a quadrangular meet and five multi-school events.









DAVID POTTINGER and Logan Harr experiment with physics apparatus, determining the wave length of a tuning fork.








