




Through school life many new friends were made and old friendships strengthened. Students gained social confidence and the ability to adapt themselves for situations and adulthood.


### Experiences prepare youth for future

This school year the student body had the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities. From these clubs and organizations the students broaden their interests in school subjects and developed social.
























### School develops social confidence




The pupils enrolled at the senior high are grateful to the taxpayers of the school district for providing them with modern educational facilities.

Guided by a capable administration and a well-trained faculty, the educational process that took place has prepared the students for advanced study or a position in the working world.

Enhancing and improving the curriculum rather than changing it was the goal set by Principal George M. Fabry for this year.

#### Complex provides modern educational facilities

Initiated were three new subjects. For the first time students could take German I, Drivers Education and Astronomy Seminar. Fourteen new faculty members were added to the teaching staff. Renovations in the library included a book depository, micro-film projector and a new charge system. Over 2000 new books were added.



## Classes, activities meaningful to senior high student body












The Lost and Found was again in operation during school hours. The service group aided at sophomore orientation and at Parents' Night.


### Girls practice skills for home, office use

Distributing Muscular Dystrophy canisters in local business establishments, viewing films and hearing speakers were among the activities of the Business Education Club.





Members of the French National Honor Society, an honorary organization, were required to take the National French exam. Winners in French II, III and IV classes received certificates of merit.






The Lab Staff completed its second year of helpful service with approximately 29 French, Latin and Spanish students assisting in the language laboratories.






During the second semester students were able to participate in many forensic activities.








After three consecutive wins to begin the season, the Wildcat football team went on to win two of the five remaining games. The Cats ended the season with an overall six won, two lost and one tie record.







The senior high school's junior varsity football team finished its season with a 5–2 record under Coach Joseph Howard.






# Wildcats victorious in section 2 games

Battling without their top scorer, Tom Mueseler, the Wildcat varsity basketball team lost the Section 2-A title in a play-off to Jeannette 50–47.


The deadlock between the two county squads resulted when both finished with 10–2 records. An upset by the Derry Area team in the final league game brought about the tie.






The Wildcats lost in the finals to Coatesville, 74–60, after winning in the opening round over Allentown-Dieruff, 93–83.



Norwin was the only team which managed to defeat the Wildcats in both meetings. Coach Wayne Etling instructed the reserves.





Latrobe's wrestling team compiled a successful nine win, three loss record as well as finishing second in the Westmoreland County and WPIAL section tournaments.




### Cat tankers compete in league action







During October girls' intramural swimming took place. The winning team was comprised of sophomores and juniors.


Volleyball games were held in March until the team with the best overall record won the championship. Both the winning volleyball team and the winning swim team received awards at the Awards Day Assembly.




### Doll-fins give show

The Biology Club was another aspect of the sophomore year. Besides fieldtrips and the Biology Banquet, members listened to talks and saw many demonstrations.










Looking over the past four years, the members of the class of 1967–68 can remember the hard work, discoveries and fun that made-up their high school days.
