



Modern plant proves functional, a help to educational goals















Dances, games enhance calendar of extra activities







Courses of study prepare students for jobs, higher education




A myriad of faces, both old and new, greeted students at the beginning of the term.

For Marianne Schaper, our foreign exchange student, it was a new way of life.


















Classroom discussions come to life under faculty guidance







The department also gives students the opportunity to participate in essay contests and forensic contests. Seniors wrote essays for the safe driving and National Ability Counts contests. Two plays are produced each year to give students who are interested in dramatics a chance to experience in this field.

The use of anthologies was added to the sophomore English classes. These books were used to introduce the students to a wide variety of types of literature. Senior English classes used vocabulary workbooks for the first time this year. Along with book reports all English classes were encouraged to do outside reading to supplement their regular class work.












Commercial classes stress skills for office workers





Classes accept challenges set forth during school year




As juniors witnessed the presentation of the class key, they had visions of the role of leadership they were inheriting.



Ten seniors were recognized by their fellow classmates as exhibiting the qualities necessary to be selected outstanding in a particular phase of school life



In regular season meets, the local harriers opened with a 27–37 loss to Kiski Area. The wildcat thinclads then went on to win the next eight contests. They defeated Conemough, Westmont, 16–52–58; Derry Area, 19–36; Southmoreland, 24–31; and Greensburg 21–34.

Coach Charles V. Findley ended his 13 years as head mentor with these gridiron accomplishments.



In compiling the unbeaten gridiron season, the Wildcats won 8 conference games and one non-league contest.








At a neutral range, the Latrobe rifle team of Coach James Harvey lost the play-off match for the Section II title to Greensburg-Salem 499–498.






The Wildcat grapplers season results showed six wins against five losses. A number of wrestlers had impressive individual records also.



Doll-fins enhance routines







Over 60 boys attended the first meeting for track candidates held in February. New equipment was available for the cindermen.



Baseball team earns victories over foes


In the initial season, Coach Richard Pipak's squad began baseball practice on March 4 and opened play in the first exhibition game with Jeannette on April 8.


Active organizations round-out life of participants

Under the supervision of their adviser, Mr. William R. Couchenour, students followed the rules of journalistic style to complete the two publications.







Students enrolled in Broadcasting I learned proper speaking techniques and how to gather and write-up the news. A Thanksgiving assembly was presented by the members of this class.










STAGE CREW — Behind the scenes of school and extracurricular programs which took place in the auditorium were the stage crew members.






AVIATION CLUB — One member called the Aviation Club "an unusual and very exciting experience in my educational advancement."






Indiana's homecoming parade was a part of the band's marching season and local parades were also components of the musicians' year.



Two musical groups in the instrumental department were added this year, the Wind Ensemble and the String Ensemble.








Honor societies bring members earned recognition





