
#### Sights, sounds relate daytime activities







# Band members form rhythmical patterns









#### Assemblies enlighten








#### Student life perpetuates lasting memories







Other supporting characters were Tim Bell, Bruce Caldwell, Bruce Hu ber, Keith Lewis and Mike Voytek.









Helping the students to become better communicators through speaking and listening was one of the main objectives of the newly instituted speech program under the direction of Miss Beth Fairley.






After the normal student work day was done, you could find gigantic rolls of paper covering the floor while the artists worked on the massive drawings that would eventually cover the walls.





With officers elected and chairmen appointed, the programs were conducted monthly after school. Miss Mary Louise McBride was faculty adviser.











"Half-a-Sixpence," this year's musical, was the story of a penniless draper named Kipps who gives his token to Bonnie Downs, a young parlormaid.














Against the nine "AA" opponents on the varsity football schedule, the 1969 Wildcat gridders recorded a four-win and five-loss record.



With a 12-0 win in the home opener over Wilkinsburg, the Latrobe team evened their won, lost record.


















Latrobe's loss to Norwin 20-13, resulted when the Knights scored twice in the final guarter.







Coach David Graham's 1969 Wildcat cross-country team ran their way to a season total of four wins and five losses.








# Roundballers end season with victory over Derry



Latrobe's junior varsity compiled a record of 7 wins and 13 losses for the 1969-1970 season.







Although three individual swimmers and the medley relay managed to break records this year, the Latrobe team didn't compile a winning season.


In section III action this year, the Wildcats came up with a 3-9 record. Counting their six exhibition meets, the Wildcat's over all record was 5-13.





Vocabulary books were also initiated into use this school year. It is hoped the juniors and seniors taking college boards may benefit from the use of these workbooks.

For the first time the department offered students the opportunity to improve their abilities in specialized fields of the subject by offering the courses, Composition and Speech and Oral Interpretation. The course in speech, which replaced the former Broadcasting I, II classes, provides the student body and faculty with informative broadcasts. Another future aim of the course is to provide students an opportunity compete in interscholastic to speech competition.

Future department plans include further broadening of the present curriculum with studies advancing into the areas of drama and the novel. These two courses may be initiated next year.

The regular U.S. History classes no longer studied history from the settlement of the country but concentrated on events from 1865 to the present.








Basic Field Biology and Geology

Each course was worth a full credit and taken all year. The only subject requiring a prerequisite was Physics. In order to take this course, a student must have had a year of Chemistry.








The future might see the introduction of a graphic arts course that would instruct students in the mechanics of printing.







Under the guidance of eight teachers, students received valuable training that would benefit them in the business or college world.











Elected to lead the junior class in their advancements were the following: Rich Kruzynski, president; Tony



The job of meeting the increasing demands for qualified people at every level of our society is the most important single task facing the nation—and the success of all our other undertakings will depend on how well we do the job.





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


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

Young Americans can help keep our nation strong and free by constant vigilance and insistance on **frugality** in the handling of public funds.

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
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
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
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
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





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
