Sprained ankles, small cuts and bruises, a sudden illness or the accidental spilling of acid in chemistry class were among the minor incidents taken care of in the health suite.





Developing skills and personal attitudes were major objectives of the Business Department for the school year.


In addition to eight regular business courses, a one-semester program was offered to seniors to help them understand the economic principles which are essential in the buying and selling of consumer products.


These courses prepare young adults for a clerical or secretarial career and help them meet the changing needs of business and industry according to Miss Florence Gill, coordinator.





"Aprender," "Lernen," "Apprendre," "To learn." This was a prime objective of the Foreign Language Department instructors regardless of the manner in which you say it.



"Le garcon il a cherche parle francais," writes three underclassmen from a homework assignment given to them by their French teacher for preparation in starting a new lesson.







Along with the literature texts and vocabulary workbooks, individual novels and collections of plays were discussed in the regular courses.



Music, a subject close to most students everywhere, provided enjoyment and challenge to many students at the senior high.









Continuing with the trend of revision, the Social Studies Department, coordinated by Mrs. Martha Rupert, made advances into the study of history and related topics.




The only class requiring a prerequisite was Physics, with one year of chemistry a requirement.



The other phase of the training open to students who had received their driving permit or license, was the actual behind-the-wheel instruction.

In the instruction, emphasis was placed mainly on defensive driving and "watching out for the other guy." Students in the course were also instructed as to the proper way to obtain a drivers' license, the importance of car maintenance and the benefits involved if a permit is sent for through the school.



Several new innovations made the Home Economics courses especially interesting this year.



This year, for the first time, the officers were elected from the student body at large instead of from the council itself. The Student Council was under the guidance of Mr. Louis T. Congelio.








It was this type of enthusiasm displayed in so many ways that made Forensics such a rewarding experience for those involved, according to Miss Beth Fairley, faculty sponsor.






Juniors and Seniors in Journalism II are recognized for their abilities with membership into Quill and Scroll.




With a flourish of trumpet notes and a roll of the drums, the Wildcat Marching Band took the field for the half-time show.

The band marched in a number of parades and in several competitions. Sites of these events included Latrobe, Greensburg, Indiana, Gettysburg and Pittsburgh.












At numerous school events the ushers were on the scene to take tickets, to distribute programs and to escort patrons to their seats.










For the second consecutive year the Wildcat grid team finished with a four win, five loss record in Foothills Conference competition.










Cats upset tigers in foothills play
















In Coach Creed Westfall's final season, the Wildcats came through with a strong 10—2 dual match record, that included an upset win over county champion Norwin





The boys took an interest in flag football that was played in the fall. Both boys and girls could compete in tennis and ping pong.












In memory
