


Functioning as an honorary society, Quill and Scroll afforded recognition to those juniors and senior members of this year's journalism class who excelled in their work.


To gain membership to this organization, students were required to produce high quality news articles and write-ups or competent material in the areas of advertising and business.

With an active interest in the world around them, students enrolled in the Union for Student Awareness had a year full of enlightening activities.


The purpose of the club was to enable members to learn more about the different kinds of political systems and governments all over the world. They also wanted to find out more about the United States government on a local, state and national level.

"He who speaks well can control the world." This quote could have very well been the inspiration for this year's forensic students as they started their second year of competition in the league.


From October to March the students attended tournaments on Saturdays at area schools. Types of tournaments ranged from oral interpretation and student congress to extemporaneous speaking.






Senior thespians perform drama







Winter brought the concert season and still more practice. Members of the band had the opportunity to perform in county and district band festivals.


From the band three other musical groups were formed. The Stage Band had 24 members and concentrated on contemporary jazz.





Their other duties include the collecting of subscription money for the publications in October and at the close of the year, they distribute "Latrobeans".
















Business club prepares members to enter the field of commerce




Escorting people to their seats and distributing programs, are only a few of the duties that were performed by the Ushers during the 1971-72 school year.








Opening practice sessions on August 18, the 'Cats met for as many as nine hours a day to work out and run plays. When school opened, practice was limited to about three hours per day.



With only four games left in the season, the Wildcats dropped two consecutive ones to contenders Greensburg-Salem and Connells-ville.













On September 27, Hempfield and Latrobe played to a scoreless tie. The Wildcat understudies then beat Norwin in a close game 8-7.






During the season, individual and team highlights helped to raise the spirit of the team. Included were an upset over Greensburg- Salem and a victory over Derry.








Latrobe was represented at the WPIAL tournament by Geary, Spratt, and Albert.






The face of Wildcat tennis changed as the Latrobe netmen moved from Section 6 to Section 8.


















Thinclads shape for initial meet



This year the department added an IBM Systems III computer to the data processing section. Seniors were taught to operate it and received knowledge on computers in general.


The purpose of this department is to prepare those interested in any business field for their future jobs, according to Miss Florence Gill, coordinator.


The foremost goal of the Language Department was to aid in the development of the students' understanding and use of foreign languages.





English courses were offered to the students either as a full year solid or an alternating semester elective for the first time during the 1971-72 school term.




One of the changes in the math department's curriculum this year was the program designed for the college bound student.


The instructors carried out their duties under the direction of Mr. Samuel Lawson, who has just finished his second year as coordinator of the department.






Offering courses that students are interested in was the chief goal of the Social Studies Department headed by Mrs. Martha Rupert.




Physics project baffles scholars






The cafeteria staff, comprised of 17 full-time women worked diligently every school day to prepare well balanced lunches for both the faculty and the student body.

Some of their many other duties included cleaning up after each of the three lunch periods and selling milk to the students who carried their lunch.






