
Friends Had Fun






They Learned Here






They Led the Way


Seniors


Underclass

Teaching English, Shakespeare, Sports Literature, and journalism, Mr. Couchenour taught a few thousand students in his 39-year career. He

'Such a nice lady' used to be in the guidance office at GLHS. Students were referring to Miss Hacker who helped 300-400 students every year. She worked out schedule problems, gave tests, wrote letters of recommendation, gave college advice, acted as a liaison between student and teacher, and often gave personal comfort. 'We miss having a lady in guidance,' said one student.

Right next door to Miss Hacker was another 'Nice lady'. School Nurse Mrs. Leonard patched wounds, took temperatures, looked at throats,

Students were lucky to have had a quality staff and administration. They were proud of what they learned from their teachers. They saluted the outstanding group of teachers and faculty of 1986-1987.






The squad also qualified to go to the Nashville, Tennessee to compete in the nationwide cheerleading competition held by ICF every year.




Student Life




Making Homes and Hobbies

The 1986-87 *Latrobean* of Greater Latrobe Senior High School, Latrobe, Pennsylvania, was printed in off set lithography by Herff Jones Yearbooks, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

It was printed in a limited edition of 925 copies and 272 pages.

The paper stock used throughout is 80 pound high gloss enamel.

The cover is a school design that is custom embossed with orange and foil white applied to black vibratex and mounted on a 160 point binder's board.

The endsheets are school designed in black on tangerine colortex stock.

The book is smyth sewn in 16 page signatures that are trimmed to 9" x12" and enhanced by decorative head and foot bands.

In addition to the black ink used throughout, there are four flats containing process four-color.

Captions are done in 6, 8, 10, and 12 point Avant Garde Book, and body copy is done in 10 point Avant Garde Book with the Senior Index in 6 point. Bold, italic, and bold italic are the emphasis type faces. Subheadlines appear in 24 point Bingham Script and Avant Garde Demi. Headlines appear in 48 point Avant Garde Demi. On the dividers, 24 point Bingham Script and the design from the cover are used.
