





MAKING A BUCK



CLOWNIN' AROUND






ENIORS: A MARK OF EXCELLENCE












Wild About Athletics






Why Do You Run?





A Tough Goodbye

Another coaching era ended this year when wrestling coach Tom "Legs" Harbert announced his resignation after twenty years at Latrobe. Harbert took over the Cats' mat program in the 1971-72 season, succeeding Latrobe's first wrestling coach, the legendary Creed Westfall. Harbert's accomplishments were beyond impressive. During his reign he captured two county titles and five section championships, while compiling a record of 198-84-5. Harbert, one of the winningest coaches in Western Pennsylvania wrestling, was named section coach of the year seven times and WPIAL coach of the year once. Harbert was also a wrestling standout at his alma mater, Wilkinsburg High School, and carried his success on to Shippensburg State College where he won a state championship at 115 pounds. He served as head wrestling coach at Saint Vincent College, Latrobe, for eight seasons before accepting his present teaching and coaching positions. During his tenure, Harbert coached some of the best and most successful wrestlers in Wildcat history including: 47 sectional champions, 36 county champs, 7 WPIAL champs, 21 PIAA qualifiers, and nine state place winners. Listing statistics just does not say enough about the enthusiasm Harbert had for each wrestler, no matter what the skill level. The wrestlers respected him because "he's a man that never quits, he always gives 110 percent," said Senior Michael Svidron. In addition to coaching and teaching at Latrobe, Harbert coaches lacrosse and mens' and womens' cross country at Saint Vincent College. Latrobe Wrestling and all who are associated with it will miss Harbert, not only for his success on the mat, but also for his one-of-akind personality. Junior Brad Cornali said, "Coach Harbert has been dedicated to the sport of wrestling and to the well-being of his wrestlers . . . I admire him and I'm going to miss the big guy."













Jioio Takes Over






In addition to swimming at Latrobe, she swam for the YMCA in Greensburg.







The Big Bang Theory

Though it may seem like a simple sport, Rifle is actually very complicated. A variety of equipment is used during a match. The most obvious piece of equipment is the rifle itself. The rifles used by our rifle team are .22 calibur Anchutz with sights that have no magnification. Shooters wear a jacket that has various pads, which halp to absorb the recoil of the gun. A sling is worn on the left arm. The sling attaches to the underside of the rifle and helps to hold it steady. Eye and ear protection are also worn.

The targets are hung 50 feet away from the firing line. Each target consists of 10 different bulls which are worth 10 points each. Each bull consists of 6 rings. If the bullet misses the bull entirely, 10 points are lost. If it lands between the fifth and sixth rings, 5 points are lost, between the fourth and fifth rings, 4 points are lost, and so on. If the bullet lands within the second ring without touching it, it is awarded an X. Thus the highest possible score on a target is 100-10X.





Justin lettered in his Freshman year, during which time he played first singles. He participates in various tournaments throughout the year. His goal for this season was to make the state finals in singles play.



A Walk Through the Field

The "track" often overpowers the "field" in Track and Field. Most people know little about the various field events, which fall into the two categories of jumping and throwing. The three types of jumps, triple, long, and high, test different abilities. In the triple jump the athlete sprints down a runway and takes off in a hop, skip, and jump series. The long jump is similar to the triple, but it consists of only one leap. In the high jump the athlete accelerates in an arc pattern toward a bar, jumps vertically, and attempts clear the bar. The throwing events are the shot put, javelin, and discus. The shot put, a strength test, weighs about twelve pounds and is thrown with an explosive, driving thrust. The discus weighs about two pounds. The throwing process is a whirling side-arm heave. The last throwing event is the javelin, which is a two pound spear of six or seven feet. It is thrown overhand, similar to a softball. Pole vaulting does not fall neatly into either category. In this event the athlete speeds down a runway carrying a pole, with which he lifts himself up over a bar. Field events are intense challenges on abilities developed through strenuous training in weightlifting, plyometrics, and sprinting.

"Things could go either way," commented boys' track coach, Bill Repko. The distance was expected to be strong with Juniors Sean Cary and Dennis Albaugh returning. Junior Tom Mains was also back as a hurdler. Repko planned to rely heavily on Seniors Butch Hantz, Scott Smolleck, and Cuong Truong, and Junior Kevin Brown in the sprinting events. Main throwers were to be Senior Paul Cunningham and Junior David Hoyle. Mains and Truong, along with Junior Jerry Shepler provided jumping experience. Many sophomores were also expected to help out the team.

At the end of the 1989-90 school year the lighting system was experiencing maintenance problems and a decision was made to replace the entire system. The project involved replacing 144 incandescent, 1500 watt, light fixtures with I 10 HID (High Intensity Discharge), 1500 watt, light fixtures. The new light fixtures weigh 60 pounds each. The uniform lighting of the entire field is due to the individual scoping of each light to hit a certain spot on the field. The entire project consisted of 300 man hours at a total cost of 22,000 dollars. This lighting system will add to the enjoyment of sporting events at the stadium for years to come.

David Robinson, the 1989-90 Rookie of the Year for the NBA had another outstanding season with the San Antonio Spurs.


Notan Ryan of the Texas Rangers became the oldest man in baseball history to record a no-hitter. He also won his 300th game to go along with his 5000 strike outs:


Ty Detmer of Brigham Young University beat the odds and Raghib Ismail for the anual Heisman Trophy.

Strickler's Drug Store, the Latrobe News Stand, and Latrobe Steel Company began to submit their advertisements to the original Latrobe yearbook, The Orange and Black in 1926. These faithful patrons continue to support our yearbook today.





Kennametal has been a successful local business. Its addition of a modern technology center hopes to boost the Latrobe economy.

Mellon Bank has been a continued supporter of the Latrobe community. The Ligonier St. office is one of the most historical buildings in Latrobe.



The Westmoreland County Airport located in Latrobe, is nationally known for its annual airshow. Former attractions have included the Blue Angels, the Thunderbirds, the Harrier aircraft, and the Stealth Bomber.


The Latrobe Plaza holds the offices of numerous local businesses. The former site of Troutman's Department Store was extensively remodeled in 1989.





MAKING US FAMOUS

The song entitled "It's a Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood" originated from Latrobe native Mr. Fred M. Rogers. Mr. Rogers was born to Mr. an Mrs. James and Nancy McFeely Rogers. A 1946 Greater Latrobe graduate, he also earned a bachelor of music degree at Rollins College in Winter Park, Florida. Appalled by the lack of quality in childrens' television programs, he decided to devote his time toward improvement. He introduced "Mr. Rogers Neighborhood" to PBS in 1965, which is the longest running children's television program. Reaching over seven million households per week and airing on 300 different stations, "Mr. Rogers Neighborhood", is the recipient of Emmy Awards, including a Peabody Award. He also founded th Family Communications Inc., which produces his show. Although, Mr. Rogers current residence is in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, he often visits the McFeely-Rogers Foundation, which is located here in Latrobe, Pennsylvania. The McFeely and Rogers families established the foundation in May of 1953. James R. Okonak, executive director of the McFeely-Rogers Foundation stated that it's purpose is to "identify and demonstrate principles, which strengthen and enrich the quality of living for individuals and their communities—especially in the Latrobe area."



The McFeely-Rogers Foundation is a very active with charity funding.

The total enrollment at St. Vincent college for the 1990-91 year is 2000 students.



Founded in 1846, St. Vincent College is located in Latrobe, Pennsylvania. A competitive college in a quaint atmosphere, St. Vincent is patterned after the lifestyle of the Benedictine Order. At St. Vincent College, the Benedictine Order has educated millions of students for fifteen centuries. The Benedictine monks participate in worship, counseling, and education. The curricla consists primarily of liberal art studies such as theology, philosophy, social sciences, laboratory sciences, mathematics, and language. The main goal of the college is to provide the human spirit with creativity, imagination, and openness. The diverse architecture of the campus reflects lifestyles from the 19th, 20th, and 21st centuries. Professional lectures, cultural performances, and various exhibits are also offered on campus. At St. Vincent College, administrators continue to broaden student career orientation by impoving human and religious values.

Strickler's Drug Store Store is located on 805 Ligonier Street, where it was originally founded in 1860. This monumental building is the oldest drug store in Latrobe. Strickler's Drug Store is a famous building in that it is the home of the first banana split. Dr. David E. Strickler, optometrist and pharmacist, created the first banana split in 1904. While traveling in Atlantic City, New Jersey, he observed businesses on the boardwalk creating various ice cream delights. Consequently, he asked Jeanette Glass company to design him a long narrow dish, in which he would place a banana, three scoops of ice cream, and three delicious toppings. The popular soda fountain was also featured at Strickler's Drug Store. The current owner of Strickler's is Mr. Thomas Lazarchik.

World famous golf celebrity, successful business executive, skilled aviator, advertising spokesman, and golf course designer are a few of Mr. Arnold Palmer's eminent titles. Born on September 10, 1929 in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, he received his first set of golf clubs from his father, Mr. Milfred J. Deacon Palmer, at the age of four. By the age of 11, Palmer was defeating caddies and other Latrobe Country Club members. Competing on the Latrobe Senior High Golf team, he soon became the dominant golfer in western Pennsylvania. At the age of 17, Palmer claimed his first of five Western Pennsylvania Amateur Championships. A few months after winning the U.S. Amateur Championship in 1954, Arnold Palmer turned professional. He joined the professional golf tour in 1955. As of 1989, he has been crowned with 92 victories, 61 PGA titles, and 12 Seniors. Mr. Palmer's all-time low 18-hole score of 60 was recorded at Latrobe Country Club, Latrobe, Pennsylvania in 1955.

The Latrobe Memorial Stadium monument attributes Latrobe as the birthplace of Professional Football.

Latrobe founded its first all-pro team in 1897. In September of 1895, six-teen year old John K. Brallier was paid ten dollars to quarterback the Latrobe, Jeanette YMCA game. After defeating Jeanette 6-0, Latrobe continued to dominate professional football in Southwestern Pennsylvania. Latrobe competed against Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Canton, Ohio, Greensburg, and Johnstown area teams. From 1903-1905, Latrobe boasted a record of 26-0-0, scoring 794 points, and only giving up five points to their oponents. The Canton-Latrobe game was the last professional game because neither town could support them financially. In 1946, the NFL recognized John K. Brallier as the first professional football player; naturally, naming Latrobe as the birthplace of professional football. However, in 1971, research showed that William "Pudge" Heffelfilger was paid \$500 to play for the Allegheny Athletic Club in Pittsburgh, on November 12, 1892, which was three years before Brallier was paid to quarterback the Latrobe YMCA game. Whether or not Latrobe is the birthplace of professional football, it is an uncontested fact that Latrobe played a significant role in the heritage of professional football.

Latrobe Makes The Map





Christopher Gist, a Virginia surveyor discovered Latrobe on November 16, 1750. In 1758, eight years after General John Forbes led his British army through Forbes Road, which is now referred to as Pittsburgh. A railroad surveyor Oliver Barnes, bought 140 acres of land, on which he built the village of Latrobe. A few streets, a hotel, and a railway station were the first landmarks in Latrobe. With rapid change after 1854, Latrobe adopted churches, a newspaper, a telegraph, and a telephone. The original schoolhouse was erected in 1882; the first graduating class was in 1883. Industries continued to expand, while the economy flourished. As of 1990, Latrobe is a proud town of 10,779 inhabitants.

Celebrating the fruits of their summit diplomacy, President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev shook hands and signed a sheaf of agreements, including a conditional trade accord. During the 1990 summit, the leaders also embraced a preliminary deal to cut long-range nuclear arms.

The centerpiece arms agreement, banning chemical arms production, was a foregone conclusion. But last-hour negotiating was necessary to settle differences on a framework for strategic arms cuts and a five-year grain deal.

The two leaders also agreed to strive for an elusive agreement on reduction of troops, tanks and conventional weapons in Europe.


From twin lecterns, the two presidents spoke of what they had done and what they hope to do. "I think what is happening now . . . represents an event of momentous importance, not only for our two countries but for the world," said Gorbachev.



David H. Souter, a mild-mannered, well-read and previously little known judge from New Hampshire, became history's 105th Supreme Court justice in October (1990) after pledging to "do equal right to the poor and to the rich."

In a brief ceremony in the crowded courtroom, Souter, 51, was administered the judicial oath of office by Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and almost immediately got to work hearing high court argument with his eight new colleagues.

Souter joins the court at a pivotal time in its history.



In August of 1990, the Iraqi army invaded Kuwait led by their 53 year-old President Saddam Hussein. Hussein is a man who shows a strange duality: tough, yet fearful; inspiring fear in his own people, yet also basking in a kind of populist veneration from many of the regions Arabs.

Hussein rose to power through opportunities and brutality, whose anti-Western views were shaped in childhood, and who now-commanding the fourth-largest army-is trying to deliver on his nationalist dreams.

There is great fear and terror surrounding Hussein and U.S. intelligence and other analysts believe this anti-Western climate could be his undoing.

After the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait, the Allies began to station men and supplies in Saudi Arabia. The U.S. Army's heaviest ground firepower reached Saudi soil in August for deployment behind Arab forces manning the front line in the standoff with Iraq.

Dozens of M1-1P tanks and M2 Bradley armored infanty fighting vehicles, and scores more heavy support vehicles, rolled off two huge transport ships at a port in northeastern Saudi Arabia and made their way north into the desert

By mid-October 1990, more than 200,000 U.S. troops had been deployed to Saudi Arabia. They were preparing to defend the desert kingdom from an Iraqi attack. Iraq has about 430,000 men in Kuwait and southern Iraq.

Among the forces to arrive in Saudi Arabia are elements of the 1st Cavalry Division, which includes the 2nd Armored Division.

The soldiers remained stationed in Iraq and tensions grew. President Bush set a January 15 deadline for Hussein to withdraw from Kuwait.

On January 17, 1991 the Allied troops began air attacks on Kuwait and the United States was at war. At the time that this book went to press no further information was known.

World in '90-'91





World leaders welcomed a united Germany into the international community on October 3 (1990), but concerns about the balance of power tempered some European enthusiasm.

In a message to governments worldwide, Chancellor Helmut Kohl pledged that Germany would never again pose the territorial claims that marked Germany from its defeat and division in World War II. "In the future, only peace will emanate from German soil," Kohl said.

His celebration came after Germany held a nightlong nationwide celebration with fireworks and music.


The nation united at the stroke of midnight when a giant German flag was raised in front of the battle-scarred Reichstag building in Berlin. Kohl and other leaders joined in singing the national anthem. The reunification came 11 months after the Berlin Wall fell in a peaceful revolt that cast aside Communist East German overlords.



Massive crowds turned out for African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela at every stop on his six-week tour of three continents. Mandela visited 14 nations in Europe, North America and Africa, achieving his goals: urging foreign governments to maintain sanctions against South Africa, raising funds for the ANC and explaining the goals of his movements.

The ANC says it aims to create a non-racial democracy and to distribute the nation's wealth more equally. Mandela, the ANC's deputy president, has said he favors a mixed economy.

Nelson Mandela, one of the world's most celebrated political prisoners, was freed by the South African government in February after 27 years in prison. He was serving a life sentence for allegedly plotting sabotage to overthrow the white government.



American conductor. composer, and pianist Leonard Bernstein was born in 1918. Perhaps best known for "West Side Story' Bernstein also composed two other musicals as well as three symphonies and three ballets. From 1958-1969 Bernstein was the

musical director of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra. Other projects included music for the motion picture "On the Waterfront." The conductor even had a book published in 1959. Bernstein died on October 14, 1990 at the age 72.



A legion of clipboard-toting counters sought out shelters, subways and steam grates in 1990 in the broadest attempt ever to find out the extent of homelessness since it became a national disgrace in the 1980s

Some homeless didn't mind the government intrusion. "It shows that they're starting to recognize us as humans and not the scum of the earth," said one young man of the streets.


Another homeless man said, "What are they going to use the numbers for anyway? To tell us there ain't no homeless problem? I'm a living example that there is a problem. We need jobs, not surveys."

The U.S. Census Bureau is spending \$2.7 million to tally homeless Americans, but critics fear an undercount will allow the government to justify cuts in services.

The homeless, now estimated to number 250, 000 to 3 million, were asked their name, age, sex, race, and marital status.

As Washington, D.C.'s deputy mayor for economic development said, the count is important because "only when we know how many homeless there are can improvements be made in the delivery of services."




Final Remarks





To begin with. this new and improved 1991 Latrobean, totally different from Greater Latrobe's past 90 yearbooks, was printed in offset Lithography by Herff Jones Yearbooks, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania 17325. Due to legislation beyond even a whale's grasp, the price of this magnificent piece of work was raised to \$27, (because of a state tax if you're not familiar with the mammal amendment). An incredible 812 books were sold. That number substituted into the formula (d1 + d2) means that out of the 999 students at GLHS, 187 will feel very stupid for the next 5 years for not investing in the greatest Latrobean ever! Next, without any argument or commotion whatsoever, evolved the design of the cover and endsheets. Who would have thought the book wouldn't end up being a paint-by-number that we were all so hoping it to be! The cover was a school designed litho with four applied colors. For the rest of the book, we used jet black ink. All pages were printed on 100 pound calais semi gloss paper. The endsheets were also school designed orange wih black ink. The first two flats were processed color, with four additional flats of spot color. We used Stymie type for 8 point captions and 10 point body copy. (Believe us, this year's body deserved the Sport's Illustrated swimsuit issue cover!) Bingham script type was used for 36 and 48 point headlines. C.T. (Cropping Tool) Miller, our Herff Jones Representative, gave his expert advise to help complete our groovy layouts and answer any questions. Kevin Schade (COPYEXPRESS EXPERT — ya right!!) helped solve any problems the Apple IIE . . . presented us with. The cover was sent to the Herff Jones Cover Plant in Montgomery, Alabama 36108, where it was mounted on 160 point binder's board, smyth sewn in 16 page signatures, trimmed to 9x12. and rounded and backed with decorative head and footbands (which can be cut out to be used for aerobicising). To the class of 1991, we hope that this book will capture how each individual has made his mark! Finally, we would like to dedicate MAKING OUR MARK to Colonel Savedge, a yearbook innovator whose undying enthusiasm will always be an inspiration, and especially, all of our soldiers serving our country in the Persian Gulf! 
JANUARY 16, 1991

The Berlin Wall crumbled without bloodshed after dividing East and West Germany for decades. Nelson Mandela was freed from a South African prison after serving 27 years as a political prisoner. Mikhail Gorbachev introduced "Perestroika" and "Glasnost" as he made sweeping reforms across the Soviet Union. The Cold War came to an end as the relationship between the United States and the Soviet Union turned into one of cooperation.

The end of the eighties seemed to signal the end of conflict in many areas of the world. Although there were still some troubled spots around the globe, many looked to the nineties as a decade of peace and

On August 2, 1990 Saddam Hussein of Iraq invaded Kuwait.

Saddam Hussein, whose name translates as "one who confronts" threatened the invasion on July 17. Our feelings of peaceful optimism disappeared as the person U.S. News and World Report magazine labeled "The World's Most Dangerous Man" sent 100,000 troops into Kuwait.



THE WORLD TO FREE KUN

- Aug. 3, 1990. The United Nations Security Council denounces the attack on Kuwait and orders world-wide economic sanctions against Iraq.
- Only a few days after the brutal attack on Kuwait, Iraqi troops move toward Saudi Arabia's border.
- As a total of 28 nations come together, Operation
 Desert Shield is born. Allied forces include the
 U.S., Italy, England, Egypt, Kuwait, Saudi
 Arabia and Canada.
- Aug. 6, 1990. President Bush commits U.S. forces to the Saudi Arabian desert. Demonstrations in support of troop deployment to Saudi Arabia, and against it, fill streets in America and abroad.
- Aug. 28, 1990. After pleas are made from around the world, Saddam Hussein releases the women and children hostages he held.
- Nov. 29, 1990. The United Nations Security Council gives Saddam Hussein 47 days to unconditionally withdraw from Kuwait. This order sets the Jan. 15 deadline.
- Dec. 6, 1990. Saddam releases hundreds of Western hostages.
- Nineteen hours after the deadline, the night of Jan. 16, 1991, the liberation of Kuwait begins

- with massive air attacks on downtown Baghdad and occupied Kuwait. Operation Desert Shield becomes Operation Desert Storm.
- Hours after the war begins, in an attempt to break up the U.S. led coalition, Saddam releases his first Scud missiles at Tel Aviv, Israel.
- In Israel's defense, America quickly sends Patriot missiles to knock out the incoming Iraqi Scuds.
 The Patriot's performance proves to be exceptional.
- Two weeks into the war, Saddam Hussein violates The Third Geneva Convention by parading allied prisoners of war on television. The battered men make statements condemning Allied attacks on "peaceful Iraq."
- Feb. 2, 1991. Saddam torches oil fields and releases more than 6 million barrels of crude from Kuwaiti tankers and offshore terminals (12 times more than the Exxon Valdez spill) in a failing attempt to ward off an amphibious attack and endanger Saudi Arabia's water supply.
- Feb. 21, 1991. Soviet diplomats meet with Iraq's foreign minister, Tariq Aziz, in an effort to draw up a cease-fire proposal that meets the conditions of the United Nations Security Council.
- · Feb. 22, 1991. President George Bush,

- reaffirming United Nations Security Council resolutions, gives Saddam Hussein less than 24 hours to get out of Kuwait or risk ground war.
- Feb. 23, 1991. The ground war attack to liberate Kuwait is launched. Over 20,000 Iraqis surrender in the first 36 hours of the confrontation.
- Feb. 25, 1991. An Iraqi Scud attack on Saudi Arabia kills 28 Americans and injures over 100.
- Feb. 26, 1991. Kuwaiti Government Officials declare Kuwait liberated.
- Feb. 27, 1991. President Bush orders a ceasefire exactly 100 hours after the beginning of the ground war assault. America suffers 292 casualties, 9 Americans become prisoners of war and 27 planes are lost. Of Iraq's 400,000 troops, 300,000 are taken from action, while 3,008 tanks and 140 planes are destroyed.

FORCES BEHIND THE FORCES





Operation Desert Storm was a war similar to wars of the past. Yet it was a war unlike any previous war. Operation Desert Storm added a new dimension to the term "war." Never before had there been laser-guided missiles; never before had women served in a military capacity on such a large scale; and never before had the United States gone into war with an all-volunteer force.

Because of the "smart" weapons being used in Operation Desert Storm, some called this the "Nintendo" war, while others referred to it as "Star Wars." In any case, the comparison was clear. This would be a war of sophisticated technology. The use of high-tech weapons would determine the

The Apache AH-64 helicopter, the M-2 Bradley and the Abram tank all made their debut as a new generation of weaponry. The Apache brought with it the laser-guided Hellfire missile that illuminated targets with a laser beam before destroying them. The 20-foot-long Tomahawk missile (smart bomb), made with small jet engines and on-board computers, was said to have a mind of its own. Programmed by an inertial guidance system, the Tomahawk could fly over 500 miles per hour. By using sensors and gyroscopes to measure changes in direction, it could be fired from a ship or submarine 1,500 miles from its target and hit it with unnerving accuracy. The Patriot missile was said to be the backbone of defense artillery. Many doubted the capabilities of the Patriot; the thought of a bullet hitting another bullet was simply unimaginable. However, like the other sophisticated weaponry used, the Patriot proved

This conflict was unlike any other in recent history for more reasons than just the use of high tech equipment and the presence of women in military roles. Perhaps the most unique thing about Operation Desert Storm was the use of the National Guard and Reserves. Many joined these organizations for patriotic reasons, while others joined to help pay for a college education or gain job experience. It was fairly safe to assume that few ever imagined that they would end up involved in a Middle-East war.

The most frightening aspect of the conflict with the Iraqi troops was the constant threat of chemical and biological warfare. No other leader in recent history had been as threatening in this respect as Saddam Hussein. Throughout the conflict military forces and civilians scrambled to get into gas masks as air raid sirens sounded. Iraqi missiles were frequently aimed at heavily populated military and civilian locations in Saudi Arabia and Israel. Precedent had shown that Hussein would not hesitate to use chemical and biological warheads.

While facing this threat, the troops involved in Operation Desert Storm had the support of the entire country. And while many may have questioned the motives behind the conflict, none questioned the valor of those who served.

The impact of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait was first felt by Americans at the gas pumps. Gasoline prices skyrocketed immediately after the invasion. The inflated prices were only temporary, however, and by the beginning of the ground war on February 23, gasoline prices averaged five cents a gallon less than the day before the invasion.

As the days dragged on with Iraqi forces still in Kuwait, people began to fear more than high fuel prices. When President Bush committed U.S. forces to the Middle East, the conflict hit home. Saddam Hussein had not only invaded Kuwait, but he had also invaded American homes. Men and women who had never imagined going to battle were sent to the Saudi Arabian desert. Suddenly this was our war. Our fathers, mothers, husbands, wives, siblings and friends were leaving the safety of home and traveling to the Middle East. Children were being left with relatives and friends as both parents were assigned to Operation Desert Shield. Reservists and National Guard members were being called upon to take an active role in the effort to free Kuwait.


As more and more civilians were being sent to the Middle East, we remembered hearing about the draft during the Vietnam War. If this conflict dragged on would the draft be reinstated? Would we be called on to go to war half a world away?

We held our breath with every news report. Months dragged by as the world waited for economic sanctions to force Iraqi troops out of Kuwait. We waited anxiously as the January 15 deadline passed. Just as the generation before us remembers JFK's assassination, we remember where we were on January 16 when we heard that the war had started. We watched in horror as Iraqi television broadcast footage of brutalized allied POWs. We stared in disbelief as the ecological balance of the Middle East was deliberately destroyed by an oil spill and oil fields that had been set ablaze. We were constantly amazed by reports of atrocities that were reported by eyewitnesses from Kuwait.

While we worried for our loved ones and friends in the Middle East, an amazing thing happened here at home. Patriotism reached an all-time high. American flags were everywhere. The country was covered with many yellow ribbons, our symbol that our thoughts and prayers were with our fellow countrymen in the Saudi desert. Not everyone agreed that we should be involved in the Middle East conflict, but nearly everyone supported the men and women who were part of the allied coalition.

The impact of Desert Storm will be with us for years to come. We will remember the waiting, the fear, the sorrow and the patriotism. We will remember how it felt to be part of the most serious conflict since Vietnam. We will also hope that this will be the only war story that we will have to tell our children.







