

Working for Quality


February 12-14, 1992 the Greater Latrobe School District underwent a kindergarten through twelfth grade evaluation by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. This evaluation was a carefully designed process for promoting the improvement of programs, services, staffing, and facilities of the member schools of the association.

The process involved three major phases. The first was a "Self Evaluation" which required a careful scrutiny of the entire educaton program by every member of the school district's staff, using an established evaluaton criteria. It included such details as reviewing educational philosophy and goals, updating and rewriting all courses of study (K-12), promoting school and community involvement in the education process, studying the effectiveness of guidance services, learning media services, student activities, auxiliary services, staff and administration.

The second phase was an "On Site Evaluation" performed by a visiting team of professional educators whose role was to compile a comprehensive written report which reflected their carefully considered commendations and recommendations. The third phase was the district's possible utilization of the committee's finding to act as a blueprint in determining budget priorities and developing plans for continually improving the programmed services for its students.

As a result of the evaluation the school district received accreditation and was renewed as a member of the Middle States Associaton. Membership attests that a school meets the MSA membership adopted standards in terms of its own stated philosophy and objectives. Greater Latrobe School District is one of only two districts in Westmoreland County to be accredited kindergarten through twelfth grade.




"Open Arms"





The senior class key is a tradition at Latrobe Senior High School. It is a symbol of power, leadership and the opening up of the future to our youth.





The only problem was with the money and working within a budget."




Since his retirement, Mr. Lavely has spent much of his time travelling. He hopes to accomplish some odds and ends he put off until he found time to work on them.

"Latrobe has one of the finest high school journalism programs in Westmorland County!" exclaimed visiting IUP professor Elaine Reed. The program of which she spoke had an enrollment of 60 sophomores, 34 juniors, and 32 seniors this year.

Any sophomore who has room in his /her schedule may elect journalism. Through this class students learn the basics of both print and broadcast, including the business side of both. If a student maintains an "A" or "B" average here, he/she is free to elect newspaper or yearbook workshops, or advertising staff.

Made up of approximately 15 reporters, 10 editors, four typists, and a photographer, the High Post workshop generates a monthly newspaper.

Sometimes four pages, sometimes six, the paper is printed in Indiana, PA. Except for pictures which must be sized, the staff sends the paper to the printer camera ready. Latrobean Workshops made up of 15 junior

assistants and 15 editors produces this book printed by Herff Jones yearbooks in Gettysburg.

Financially, the Latrobean and High Post are completely funded through subscriptions and advertising. With a budget of between \$25,000 and \$30,000 the six students on the ad staff run the subscription drive, solicit all the advertising, lay out the ad pages, and keep all financial records.

Also Coming out of the publications' department are the creative writing

magazine, "Window to the Mind," and the morning broadcast crew. Any student in either workshop may work on these two projects. This years morning announcements were presented live on TV right before Channel One.

So, for anyone considering a career in communications Latrobe's journalism program gives him/her "hands-on" experience for just about every aspect of such a career.



Since then she has been reaching in various settings and fields which include Health and Physical Education, sixth grade, Learning Support classes, and Chapter 1 Reading.


We are happy to have her back as a Learning Support reacher. About reaching she says, "Teaching proves to me everyday that success is a journey, not a destination."



Spotlight on Ms. Schmidt




















with returning divers, Juniors Amy Johnston and Tricia Sutton, he helped the younger divers in the program to improve their ability and technique throughout the season.








Fresh Scents



New Releases

What do people from all over do when the weekend is a flop? When they don't feel like leaving home? When the party is slowly dying down to a fierce nothing? Pop a movie into the VCR and everyone is suddenly enthralled. All American Video, located at 334 Main Street in Latrobe, was opened in July 1991 after owners, Maria, Kevin, and Brian Wanichko bought out Rick's Video. With over 4500 titles in 16 categories including drama, comedy, adventure, and mystery, All American had one of the best selections around. New releases cost \$2.50 while all others were 99 cents. Aside from renting movies, they also rented Nintendo games and systems, camcorders and VCR's. All American was open Monday through Saturday from 11 AM to 8 PM and since they were closed Sundays, it was a free day.



Community Health

On May 1, 1959 Mosso's Pharmacy was opened on Ligonier Street by Joe Mosso who was later joined in the business by his son, Joe Mosso, Jr. Other than filling prescriptions, Mosso's offered services such as patient consultation, computerized patient prescription records and tax reports, emergency prescription service 24 hours a day, 7 days a week (the first pharmacy in the Latrobe area to offer this service), free prescription delivery and personal charge accounts, to name a few. Deliveries were made Monday through Friday. In 1968, Joe Mosso, Sr. founded the Committee on Drug Education and because of his involvement in the prevention of drug abuse, has spoken in 32 states, 17 schools of pharmacy, and eight countries. For over 30 years, Mosso's Pharmacy has progressed in the pharmacy business.

Since the 50's, high-school students from all over have flocked to the popular under 21 night spot on Depot Street in Latrobe. It's many names have ranged from Danceland, Kaleidescope, Studio "44" and Bonkers, to Illusions. Harry Lattanzio said, "Rock and roll, disco, new wave, and rap were a few of the most popular types of music and during the many years the crowds were good with wall to wall kids on many occasions." Renovations to keep up with the times were always a must and something the young kids enjoyed. Harry commented, "A new look created excitement and interest and a fun time for all." Kids have come from as far as Johnstown, Pittsburgh, Indiana, and Uniontown, but mostly from Latrobe, Greensburg and Derry. Illusions was available to rent for private parties such as class reunions, high school band and student council parties, as well as birthday parties. As long as it is open, Illusions will always be a popular place to be on the weekend for many young adults.

Since 1979, David F. Giannilli has operated Gino's Pizza in Latrobe. Specializing in Italian food, Gino's also offered steak and chicken among others. The most popular item on the menu was found to be the pepperoni and mushroom pizza. Gino's offered a dining room and free delivery. It was also frequented by high school students after sporting events. Mr. Giannilli commented "Latrobe has been super. The people are great."



Bake it and

Cookies, pies, and cakes may sound like an unneeded luxury to some and an addiction to others, but to Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Colaianne, owners and operators of Dainty Pastry Bakery, it was a business. The bakery was founded by Robert N. Colaianne behind Miller Street in 1947 and the first sales room was opened at the Hagan Store in 1948. After several relocations, Dainty Pastry was moved to the 339 Depot Street location on July 20, 1975. In 1978, they became the instore bakery for Thorofare Stores and remained there until Thorofare closed. In September, 1985 the instore bakery was reopened with the Skatells at Foodland. Seventy-five hundred feet of the bakery on Depot Street were utilized and approximately 30 people were employed. Dainty Pastry served restaurants from Greensburg to Ligonier and others in Blairsville and Indiana.



Post it!!!

Most people don't think about where their letter is about to go when they put it in the mailbox, maybe just because they don't know much about their local post office. The first Latrobe Post Office went into business on May 16, 1852 and William H. Barnes was the first Postmaster. In 1936, the Post Office was moved to where the Borough Building stands now. On May 12, 1939, Latrobe made history as one of the stops on an experimental Air Mail flight. The Post Office located on Jefferson Street was established on June 15, 1975 and Robert E. Cunningham served as Postmaster as of May 3, 1981. The amount spent on postage has increased over the years and in 1990, postal receipts totalled \$2,282,510. The 54 postal employees at the Latrobe Post Office were partly made up of 13 clerks, 15 city delivery routes and eight RD rural delivery routes. Latrobe's major mailers included Kennametal, St Vincent College, and Latrobe Area Hospital. The Latrobe Post Offce operates under the Pittsburgh Division located in Pittsburgh.

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
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
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


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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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


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


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Te takes

Firefighters were unprepared for the sight they were met with in Kuwait—scores of oil wells sending plumes of red and orange flames 30 yards into the air. Oil lakes and soot blackened the sand.

During the seven-month Iraqi occupation of Kuwait, more than 730 oil wells were damaged or set ablaze. Firefighting crews have been able to extinguish 584 wells since the effort began in March 1991.


Terry Anderson emerged on December 4, 1991, after 6 1/2 years of captivity in Lebanon and was handed over to U.S. officials, ending a brural hostage ordeal.

"You just do what you have to do," he said. "You wake up every day and summon up energy from somewhere, and you get through the day, day after day." Anderson, 44, the longestheld Western hostage, came to personify the long-running hostage ordeal. Asked if he had any last words for his kidnappers, he rolled his eyes and said: "Goodbye."










About 2 million Iraqi Kurds and other minorities fled north in April 1991, when Kurdish rebels in the north and Shiite Muslim rebels in the south failed to out President Saddam Hussein in the aftermath of the Persian Gulf War. At least 6,700 of th Iraqi refugees died fleeing to the Turkish border.

The most common causes of death among the Kurds were diarrhea, respiratory infections and trauma, the Center for Disease Control reported. And 63 percent of all deaths occurred among children under age five.

Military units from the United States and at least seven other countries participated in a relief effort along with civilian agencies from about 20 countries. The relatively quick, cooperative response helped keep the death rate as low as it was,

"There were U.S. soldiers, Dutch nurses, and Red Cross workers working side by side. There was little friction," Dr. Michael J. Toole of the CDC's International Health Program Office said. "It really was an unprecedented effot."



Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbechev and his family were placed under house arrest in the Crimea on August 19, 1991, as an eight-man emergency committee led by Vice President Gennady Yanayev took power in a coup attempt in the Soviet Union. The statue of the founder of the KGB was toppled while thousands of Muscovites watched. Freedom has come to the Soviet Union.

Taking a Look at America

A sealed structure of steel and glass will be "home" for two years to four men and four women. The structure, called Biosphere 2, is about the size of 2 1/2 football fields and contains all necessities of life. For two years, nothing will be introduced from the outside. In addition to eight humans, Biosphere 2 houses 3,800 species of animals and plants and five ecosystems. This \$100 million project has taken seven years to put together and hopes to be the model for other self-sufficient environments. Planets other than Earth (Biosphere 1) may one day be the base for similar structures.

Much skepticism has been expressed by the scientified community, however. Many scientists seem to feel this experiment a ridiculous sham, designed to draw spectators who will spend around \$10 just to view the sphere and spend even more in the gift shop. Both participants and backers of the Biosphere 2 maintain that the project will provide significant data.

Paul Simon is still singing after all these years.

On August 15, 1991, Simon and a 17-piece band drawn from five nations stepped on stage in Central Park for a free concert lasting almost three hours. Erstwhile partner Art Garfunkle was not, however, by his side. The Central Park concert, attended by over 500,000 fans, is part of a longer trip, a pause in his "Born at the Right Time" tour of almost 14 months that he says will end early next year in Africa after stops in Japan, China, Australia, and South America.




Pushed by 25 mph winds across brush that had been dried by five years of drought, the October 1991 blaze destroyed more than 1,800 houses and 900 apartments, city officials said.


President Bush declared the fire site a major disaster area, opening the door to federal aid for the rebuilding.


On October 18, 1991, Clarence Thomas became the 106th United States Supreme Court Justice.

"I'm giong to go on, I'm going to beat it and I'm going to have fun," he insisted.





The 1992 Larrobean, of Greater Latrobe High School, Larobe, PA 15650, was printed in offset lithography by Herff Jones Yearbooks, Gertysburg, Pennsylvania 17325. The local representitive is C. T. Miller and the customer service adviser was Barbara Hale. Additional advice and design assistance was provided by the company art department under the direction of John Sullivan.

The press run for 1992 was 825 copies of 244 pages. Paper is Ermine matte except for pages 1 through 32 which were printed on 100 # Bordeaux gloss.

The cover was custom designed on black vibra rex material with foil stamping in lieu of applied colors and varnished accents. It was mounted on 160 point binder's board at he Herff Jones Cover Plant in Montgomery, Alabama 36108. The book was smyth sewn in sixteen page signatures, trimmed to 9x12, rounded and backed with decorative head and foot bands.


