

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
AWS RLL of Difference



After wandering through the school on a five minute hall pass. Senior Mark Matthews decides to head back to class. While education was important, students sometimes needed a quick break from the stressful school day.
















The prices ran anywhere from eight to 20 dollars for one cassette or compact disc.

Another year. Another spirit week. Another homecoming. Another rival decorating contest.



The sophomore class get on their feet and show some school spirit at the year's first pep assembly. Cheering was a great way to blow off steam after a long day.




After Hours

Shutting-out backyard rival Derry 27-0 while allowing only 57 yards rushing was just the beginning of an impressive season for the Wildcat football team. Coach John Bainbridge's Cats finished 5-3 in the section and 7-3 overall--the first winning season for Latrobe since 1984.

Coach Bainbridge, in his third year with the team, attributed their success to "the seniors who provided excellent leadership. The underclassmen improved as the season went on and we built a foundation to build upon." Seniors Bob Baum, Kelly Frederick, and John Andrighetti were selected to the Section One Quad A All-Conference first team. 




Fancy Footwork








Running Wild

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














Looking Abead




Freshman Adam Love proved to be a big help to the team. He broke several school records and qualified for WPIAL competition as well. One of his strong events was the 200 meter individual medley.




Checking It Out






Senior Marc Leone waits for the whistle to begin his match. Competition to wrestle on the varsity level was tough this year.








Covering the Bases







Senior Justin Rosenthal hits an easy forehand shot. Rosenthal, in the first singles spot, helped the team's success throughout the season.











So, what did ya think? Did you like it? Huh, huh? Did ya? Before you do some serious praising of the '93 Latrobean staff; listen to the way we did it all. (Not like you'll ever really understand.)

The 1993 Lattobean of Greater Lattobe High School, Lattobe PA 15650 was printed in offset lithography by Herff Jones Yearbooks, Gettysburg, PA 17325. Our local representative is C.T. Miller (the Layout God), and the customer service adviser is Barbara Merson. The company art department, under the direction of John Sullivan, provided us with additional advice and design assistance.

The press run for 1993 was 780 copies of 248 pages. The first 32 pages were printed on 100# Bordeaux gloss paper and the remainder on 100# Calais semi-gloss.

The cover was eustom embossed on antique blue vibra tex material with foil scamping and silver lacquer applied. It was mounted on 160 point binder's board, at the Herff Jones Cover Plant in Montgomery, Alabama 36108. The book was smyth sewn in 16 page signatures, trifamed to 9x12, rounded and backed with decorative heat and foot bands.

The endsheets were school designed, DF + B on 65# material stock printed with PMS #286 ink. In addition to the high earbon jet-black ink used throughout, there are four-flats with process four-color.

Type is Gafamond with appropriate emphasis faces done in 8 and 10 point for capnons and 12 point for body copy, Headlines appear in 24, 36, and 42 point Garamond Italic faces. The CopyExpress program was used to submit copy.
