















What exactly went on behind the scenes of the High Post? Year-round the newspaper staff worked hard to produce monthly

Advised by Mrs. Henderson, the staff met fifth period daily to work on the newspaper. Starting in September, the editors worked on finding new and interesting story ideas, drawing layouts for their page, and checking all copy for errors. In addition, editors tried to feature more students by adding student features, such as "In The Spotlight." 






"It was a nice chance to do something good for others and get involved in activities which benefited the community," said Senior Mandy Zenone.




Whether students got hands on experience or learned in a classroom, they both discovered something different about another culture.




After returning from the trip Senior John Hauser said, "The trip proved to be very beneficial to the group as a whole."


Setting The Scene




Outstanding Seniors





National Merit Scholars

Each year, thousands of high school students across the nation take the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test or more commonly known as the PSAT's. Most of them take this test to get an idea of the type of questions which they will have to answer on the SAT's. Many colleges take the test scores into consideration when choosing prospective students.

There are quite a few, however, that take the PSAT's to compete for the prestigious National Merit Scholarship Award. The scores of all juniors in the nation are compiled and the top one percent gain eligibility for this accolade. This one percent are known as Commended students. The top one-half of those move on to Semi-Finalist status and about one out of every five of these become an actual Finalist.

"Most colleges offer scholarships ranging from a small amount all the way up to full tuition for being recognized in one of the three groups," said Guidance Counselor Mr. Ryder.

Ten students were acknowledged as Commended students from their junior year PSAT test scores. They included Seniors Becky Cox, Amber Hutchinson, Heather Blaker, Tony Lanza, Jon Engle, Lindsay Fitzpatrick, Craig Warner, Erin Pohland, Ben Cirota and Cecilia Dickson. Of these, Warner, Pohland, and Dickson were also recognized as Semi-Finalists.

"To be compared to other students across the nation and to rank so well was quite an honor," said Warner.























Many broken records improved the success of the team. Including Bell who broke his own individual record with a 94 (out of 100).







They began practices with running and stretching drills followed by situation drills. Each practice ended with wrestling an opponent.


"There are about a 1,000 situation drills," commented Coach Billett. "I like to use them because they reinforce what they already know and they can apply something that they just learned."

Junior Brett Lundquist concluded, "Our long work and perseverance finally paid off in the end."









"Although practices could be tough, our skills definitely improved by the end of the season," commented Junior Tracy Ross.









The players centered on specific areas. Ground strokes, serves, volleys, and overhead shots included the essence of each practice.





Meets with strong rival teams such as Greensburg Salem, Hempfield, and Norwin motivated the team to an exciting drive for victory.






The coaches also appreciated their assistance. Coach Chamberlain, baseball coach, said, "The trainers offered valuable assistance to me in times of injury and emergencies."


